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CONSTITUTION

Enclosed with this Newsbulletin is a copy of the proposed constitution for our Society. When the Society formed on the 3rd May 1974 its name, aims and membership requirements were decided by the original members. The full constitution now being submitted for members' consideration includes these original clauses plus a number of new ones designed to cover the needs of an active Society. Furthermore, it has recently become apparent that several changes to the original clauses may be desirable and these proposed alterations are included for your consideration along with a request for approval of the overall constitution.

The constitution is designed to make due allowance for our unique circumstances whereby Society membership is scattered throughout Australia with little or no chance of ever having a significant percentage of members assembled for a business meeting, and whereby all Society business is notified to members by mail.

The constitution provides for a "SENESCHAL" to be appointed as titular head of the Clan in Australia pending the appointment one day (I hope) of an Australian Chieftain. Seneschal is an old Teutonic title given to the major domo of the ancient houses - he was virtually the senior administrator and the logical head of the household during times of absence of the true head and his immediate family. The term "An Marischal Tighe" (the Seneschal) appears in Scottish lore when he acts as marshal of proceedings at an inauguration of a Chief. Duties and responsibilities of the Seneschal have also been detailed in the constitution.

The cases for and against any proposed alterations are outlined in the encl sed paper. Members are asked to complete the accompanying voting paper and return it in the stamped addressed envelope provided by Tuesday 30th September 1975.

Note Voting papers have not been included with Newsbulletins forwarded to prospective members.

CLAN DINNER

The first Official Dinner of the Society was held in the Officers' Mess, RAAF Headquarters Support Command at Victoria Barracks Melbourne on Friday 25th July last. Thirty seven members and guests sat down to the meal... this included seven who journeyed down from Sydney. It was an excellent dinner, held in pleasant surroundings with enjoyable company — the tartan was in evidence everywhere and several members were resplendent in kilts. Acting President A.C.(Sandy) McPhie gave a brief summary of Clan and Society developments.

Not many c the members knew one another before the commencement of the evening, but judging by the talking during the dinner and the reluctant leavers at the finish many friendships were made amongst the brand new cousins. Altogether a memorable evening.... A report from the first edition of the Melbourne Age of 25th July is attached. Unfortunately this item was deleted from the later (city) editions.

For the financially inclined the evening ran at a slight loss due to higher than expected staff charges. We are indebted to Charles for the donation of the Haggis and to another member for waiving the refund of money paid for his wife who unfortunately was unable to attend. THE INTERNATIONAL FROMT

Highlight of the International Scene this time is undoubtedly the visit of Society Treasurer Sandy McPhee, wife Norah (one of our Historians) and daughter Sally to the Gathering of the Clans at Grandfather Mountain. All three are members of our Society, and Sandy came away from there an Honorary Member of The MacDuffee Clan of America. The welcome and hospitality exyended to them by the Americians was magnificent and they were guests of honour at every MacDuffee function at the Games. One of the local press reports of their visit is attached. Although Sandy elaims I was responsible for talking him into the trip it was due to the arrangements made by the American Society President, Jamie McDuffie and wife Mary that the visit went off so well. Perhaps next year we'll be able to arrange with Sandy to fly us all across in one of his 747s.

The Highland Games at Grandfather Mountain provided the setting for joining of hands between clansmen in two countries this weekend.

The Clan MacDuffie of this country and Clan PcPhee of Australia met for the first time this weekend at Grandfather. The clans are members of the same family that originated on the isles of Colonsay and Oransay off the east coast of Scotland, and was known as Dhubhsith. Deviations of the name include MacDuffie, Duffy, McGuffie, MacHaffie, McAfee, MacFie, Mac-Phee, and Shaw.

Jim McDuffie of Hendersonville, president of the MacDuffie Clan of America, Inc., represented the American cousins while A.L. McPhee, treasurer of the Australian McPhee Clan and a 747 Pilot with Quantas Airline, represented the Australian

It was at the McDuffie's invitation that the McPhee's made the long trek across the Pacific and the United States to Grandfather, the sort of Mecca like spot in the highlands of North Carolina which is somewhat the spiritual home of the Scots in America

The American cousins, some of whose forebears go back to the early 1700s in the history of America and who fought against the Tories in 1776 are among sponsors of the Grand-

There are three clans in Canada, one in Sweden, one in Australia and one in the United States

One immediate goal is closer unification of all the different clans to develop a shrine on the ancestral isle. McPhee, his wife, Norah, and daughter, Sally, were at Grandfather, Linville and the Boone area for the

The family said it was overwhelmed with the hospitality of the friendly Scots who attended the games

"Now we want the McDuffie's to visit us," he said.

BE WARY OVER COAT OF ARMS

MANY people mistakenly believe that coats

of arms belong to all persons having the same surname in common. At law, arms are an incorporeal hereditament in the nature of a dignity, and nereoltament in the nature of a dignity, and as such the only persons who are entitled to use them are those granted the arms, and, subject to certain qualifications, their legitimate descendants.

As a result of this misunderstanding, many people have bought their coat of arms over the whon counter or from a mail order firm

the shop counter or from a mail order firm specialising in the field, in the honest belief that they are entifled to them. In many cases, this belief is perpetrated by

the firms themselves in that they do not require proof of the entitlement of the arms purchased. Obviously it is not in their own interests to do so, as very few purchasers

could provide such proof.

Because heraldry is such a technical
subject, there have also been many cases
where the arms supplied do not always relate to the family name and the purchaser is none

the wiser

Recently I came across an issue of an Recently I came across an issue of an Regulish Consumers' Association Magazine which had looked into the trade of painted coats of arms. A number of test examples were carried out on various firms covering the surnames Sandringham. Samson. Edge, Bibby (three instances), Beresford and Adamson. Of all these, only the coat from Edge ordered by an already armigerous investigator turned out to be approximately correct. correct

In most of the other cases, the arms depicted were for different names — Brune for Beresford, Macadam for Adamson, Bibersworth and Bebb for Bibby, Ducy for Samson and Sander for Sandringham It senson and Sander for Sandringham It most cases the firms in selecting arms had been mislead by arms wrongly described in Burke's Obsolete Canaral Armsy.

I can add to this the experience of an American friend who sent to England for a coat of arms. He cited his family name and enclosed a draft with his order. In due course, he received a coat of arms. Some time later it was discovered that the arms supplied were those of a local council which happened to have the same name as his surname.

If, without proof of entitlement, one wants to buy a coat of arms as a decorative wall plaque, that is fair enough, but it is nothing more or less than a decoration. For the more or less than a decoration. For the genuine purchaser of arms the motto must be caveat emptor — let the buyer beware.

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The Clan McPhee in search of new Chief

It should be a braw bricht nicht down in the RAAF Officers' Mess at Victoria Barracks tonight.

They're putting on a traditional Scottish dinner for 40 people who don't know each other very well.

But they will need to get on first-name terms rather rapidly — their sumames, d'ye ken, are all McPhee (or some name phonetically similar).

For the McPhee Clan of Australia Society, whose members are descendants of the ancient Scottish High-land clan Macfie, are hold-ing their first official dinner.

Among the guests will be two Neil McPhees — one the chief executive of the RACV, the other Victorian head of the Commonwealth Development Bank.

Mr. Charles Macphee, father of the Liberal MHR for Balaelava (Mr. Ian Macphee), will give the Address to the Haggis.

And the society's treasurer, Qantas pllot Mr. Sandy McPhee, will report on his recent trip to a gathering of the Highland

The organiser of the dinner is Squadron Leader Alex "Sandy" McPhie, who is acting president of the sacciety and the originator in Australia of efforts to get the McPhee Clan going again.

He began 18 months ago after being contacted by Dr. Earle Douglas MacPhee, Dean Emeritus of the University of British Columbia in Canada, who has written the clan's history.

Dr. MacPhee aims to get the McPhees of the world to find a new chief, who has to be approved by the heraldic authority in Scotland, the Lord Lyon King of

Control of the state of the sta

The last chief was Mal-colm Macfle, who was mur-dered in 1623 by one Col. Kiddo Macdonald. The McPhees then dispersed McPhees then dispersed from their ancient lands of Colonsay and Oronsay islands, at the southern end of the Hebrides.

Main populations of Mc-Phees are now in the United States. Canada, Australia and Sweden, which each have clan societies. Strangely, there is none in Scotland.

Squadron Leader McPhie said it could take another five years before the McPhees found their chief — and he would be unlikely to come from Australia.

There are 47 ways of spelling the name — and procedure and McMarch 1888.

spelling the name — and people named McHaffie, Mc-Guffie and McDuffee are also eligible to join the clan society.
