ELECTION OF MEMBERS TO THE SOCIETY EXECUTIVE

In accordance with paragraph 7 of the Society Constitution, nominations are now called for for the election of the following members of the Society Executive for the 1978 - 1979 term of office -

Treasurer

Nominations close with the Secretary on 14th December 1977, and are to be in writing specifying the nominee's name and nominated office. They are to be signed by the nominee, proposer and seconder.

Note: Only financial members of the Society are eligible to accept nomination for office, or to propose, second, or vote for nominees for office.

Additionally, in the case of a State Vice-President, only financial members in the State concerned are eligible to accept nomination for such office, or to propose, second, or vote for nominees for State office.

The State Vice-President jobs are not very demanding. The incumbent is looked on as Society (and Clan) representative for the State and would be called upon to act in that capacity should the need so arise. As a member of the Society Executive a State Vice-President participates in running Society affairs, however, business is conducted through the mail so there is little cost or time involved in that regard. State Vice-Presidents are expected to organize at least one social function in their own area each year, and, of course, may form State committees to further Society and Clan aims, should they so wish.

If an election of Executive members is required, ballot papers will be mailed by 28th December and be returnable by 25th January 1978. Results will be notified to members with Newsbulletin No 17 in February next, and transfer of responsibilities will take place at the 2nd Biennial General Meeting next year.

THE RESERVE OF THE PARTY OF THE

REVEREND GEORGE MACFIE HINISTER AT PORTLAND HEAD & PITT TOWN

1842 - 1867

One of the early settlements west of Parramatta was established in 1802 at Portland Head, near Windsor. The first settlers came by boat along the Hawkesbury River to take up the land allotted to them. Their religious services were held in the open, or in settlers' homes, until they erected a small slab building with grass thatch roof as a church. In 1808 the tiny community commenced building a permanent church at Ebenezer. It cost £400 and was constructed with stone walls two feet thick. Completed in 1809, it was the first Presbyterian Church in Australia and the first church in the country to be erected by voluntary help and contributions. It is now the oldest church of any denomination in Australia which is still used for public worship.

The Rev. George Macfie was the third, and the longest serving, of the inisters at Ebenezer. He was born at Calton, Glasgow, on 3rd October 1789 to Alexander Macfie (1755 - 1823) of Bute and Mary Sinclair (1767 - 1828) of Lorne. He matriculated at the University of Glasgow in 1808, and was employed for some years as a school teacher until, in 1828, he was licensed by the Presbytery of Brechin in Scotland. He was ordained on 2nd July 1828 and appointed to the Parish Church of Birdhopcraig (Northumberland) as the first minister to serve in the New Kirk. He resigned on 11th June 1837 to migrate to Australia.

In April 1833 the Rev. George had married Elizabeth, daughter of John Hutcheson and Susannah Smith of Fulbar, Renfrew, in the Parish Church at Renfrew. They had six children, two born in Scotland and four in Australia -

The family sailed for Australia in July 1837 aboard the "Portland", and arrived in Sydney on 3rd December of that year. There were eight ministers and four probationers on the vessel, with their families, coming to Australia under the sponsorship of Dr John Dunmore Lang. The Rev. George Macfie settled first at Penrith, but after six months he moved with his family to Bergalia in south eastern New South wales, and, operating from his home as there was no church, he travelled the district between Bergalia and Bega moving from station to station, preaching, marrying and baptising. In 1842 he was called to Portland Head and Pitt Town and inducted to Ebenezer by the Presbytery of Windsor. He continued to visit the Bergalia area until 1859 or later.

Documenting this man's twenty five years of service to the community at Fortland Head and Pitt Town will probably never be done in full, but it requires little thought or imagination to visualize the record of dedication and devotion of a country minister in the Australian bush towns during this era. It is known that the family resided at Pitt Town; that the Rev. George was the Minister there when the Pitt Town Presbyterian Church was built; and it is recorded that he laboured in his parish with much zeal and acceptance.

Perhaps the most reported incident during these years dealt with the "big" flood of 1867 and is viewed in lighter vein to-day, though pathos is ever present in such stories of our early settlements. The Ebenezer Church was built close to the river so that it might serve the settlers on both sides equally well. In fact,

river funerals were once a most impressive and unusual ceremony there with funeral parties coming by boat along the river, or across from the far side, to land on a small sandy beach close to the church and then to walk up to the cemetry. In 1867 flood rains fell in the Hawkesbury catchment and the river rose at an alarming rate. The Rev. George's daughter, Mary Sinclair, was to be married at this time and preparations continued despite the downpour. Flood waters actually entered the Manse as the ceremony commenced and continued to rise so quickly that proceedings were abandoned the moment they were pronounced "Man and Wife". The bride and groom (and no doubt the others present also) escaped through an attic window and into a waiting boat, but the wedding breakfast was claimed by the flood.

During this flood the Rev. Macfie lost all his books and flood devestation rendered the Manse uninhabitable for a time. The Reverend George retired in 1867 - soon after the flood. He died at "Kegworth", Petersham, Sydney on 17th December 1869, and is buried in Balmain Cemetry. An obelisk to his memory is in the churchyard at Ebenezer. His wife, Elizabeth, died at Linden, New South Wales, on 22nd June 1899. The following descendants of theirs are members of our Clan Society -

They are descended from the second daughter, Mary, who married William Thomas Poole during the 1867 flood - Kerr and his family live on the banks of the Hawkesbury at Penrith to-day where they can look out on the not infrequent river floods, and no doubt think back to the near catastrophe of 110 years ago. Descendants of the younger son of the Rev Macfie's, John Hutcheson, are believed to be alive to-day, but no contact has been made with the Society as yet.

International. We have also recognised, and indicated our willingness to financially support, any appointment the Clan MacPhee Society of Scotland may make as Keeper of the Records of the Clan.

Society. The Executive have decided to introduce a series of Society Standing Orders to officially record decisions taken on the interpretation or application of the various paragraphs of the Society Constitution. The following have been determined to date -

- Membership subscriptions paid by new members on or after the first day of November are to be credited as their membership subscription for the ensuing year.
- Expenses incurred by the President for postage, telephone and minor administrative items are to be automatically repaid on submission of an account to the Treasurer.
- A Clan Seneschal, when appointed, is recognised by the Executive as the Titular Head of the Clan in Australia.
- 4. The required election for members of the Executive is to be carried out prior to the expiration of the sitting Executive's term of office. Transfer of responsibilities of office is to be made at the conclusion of the next following Biennial General Meeting of the Society.

SCOTTISH SHORTBREAD BISCUITS

* cup plain flour 2 tablespoons ground rice 4 cup sugar 125g (4oz) butter or substitute 1 egg, separated

1 egg, separated 1 tablespoon cream

Sift flour and ground rice into bowl, rub in butter until the mixture resembles coarse breadcrumbs. Add sugar, combine well. Add combined egg yolk and cream, mix to a firm dough. A little extra cream may be needed if dough is too dry (approximately 2 teaspoons). Roll out dough thinly on lightly floured board to 3mm ($\frac{1}{2}$ in) thickness. Cut into rounds with floured 3.5cm ($\frac{1}{2}$ in) fluted round cutter. Prick top of biscuit with fork, put on greased oven trays, bake in moderately slow oven 15 minutes or until biscuits are very lightly browned. Remove from tray, cooling on wire rack. Makes approximately 35.
