THE MACPHEES IN GLENDESSARY

We are indebted to the MacPhee Clan Society of Ontario for this extract from John Stewart of Ardvorlich's 'The Camerons' - a History of Clan Cameron.

A branch of the MacPhees lived at Glendessary and in adjacent parts for hundreds of years. They were followers of Lochiel, but generally retained their own name. They were a branch of Clann Dhubhi whose chief, MacPhee of Colonsay, had been driven out of that island at an early date and the clan became 'broken men' and had to settle as best they could in other clan territories.

According to tradition the MacPhees came to Lochaber in the following way.

One winter the chief of Colonsay, who was well-known for his handsome figure and physical strength, was on a visit to Lochaber. He and his servant got lost in the wilds of that country and as night was approaching, they feared that they would have to spend the night on the moor but luckily saw a faint glimmer of light some way off. They made for it and found it came from a humble bothy. They knocked on the door which was opened by an old woman of pleasant appearance and Colonsay told her that they were lost and sought shelter for the night. The old woman exclaimed, 'Fasgadh cha'n fhaigh sibh an so.' (Shelter! You can't get it here). The Chief replied, 'Fasgadh tha mi ciallachadh fhaotainn' (Shelter I mean to have). The cailleach replied, 'Chi sinn, 'nuair thig Mor mo nighean dachaidh.' (We'll see when Mor, my daughter, comes home.).

The travellers made themselves at home by the fire and soon the outer door opened and someone entered, went to the other side of the house, and discarded a heavy burden. This was Mor coming home with the half carcass of a cow! On seeing the two strangers she asked her mother who they were and said, 'Daoine ladarna' (Bold men).

MacPhee tried to explain, but Mor caught him by his jacket and with one heave flung him out of the door. Not to be outdone, MacPhee caught Mor, who had followed him out, and with a great heave flung her back into the house! Whereupon Mor exclaimed, 'Mata bho'n 's tu a' cheud neach a bha comasach air a leithid a dheanamh a thachair ormsa, 's e lan dith do bheatha fuireach a nochd.' (Well; since you are the first person I have met able to do the like, you are quite welcome to spend the night under this roof.).

In due course a son was born to Mor of which MacPhee was the alleged father. The day the child was born his grandmother planted a young tree in front of the house. Mor nursed the child for seven years and on his seventh birthday, she sent him to pull the tree from its roots, but he failed to do so. After another seven years she told him to try again, but again he failed. When he was twentyone she once more told him to go out and pull the tree, and this time he succeeded. She then told him about his father and gave him leave to visit him in Colonsay.

The young man set out and secured a boat and crew in Kintyre who would take him to the island, but on reaching the bay near where MacPhee's house stood, he noticed that the men became restive and uneasy so he asked what was the matter, and they told him no boat dared to land without the chief's permission. He made them beach the boat and as they did so MacPhee came storming down to the shore.

MacPhee demand to know who they were and who gave them leave to land, and young MacPhee told him that the crew did so on his orders and would stay there until he told them to go. This infuriated THE MACPHEES IN GLIMBESSARY

the Chief who grabbed the bow of the boat and started pushing it off the shore. Young MacPhee thereupon leapt to the stern of the boat and shoved against his father, and so evenly were they matched that neither could outshove the other.

Seeing that he had met his match MacPhee asked the young man who he was and where he came from and the son revealed his identity. His father received him with great joy and was most anxious that he should stay with him on Colonsay, but after some days he returned to his mother's country, saying that he preferred the wilds of Lochaber to sea-girt Colonsay. That is how the first MacPhee settled in Lochaber according to the 'ceilidh sgeulachd'. *

In the Valuation Roll of the Annexed Estate of Lochiel of 1762, which has already been quoted, Alexander MacPhee, wadsetter in Glendessary, stated that he heard a tradition in the country that his ancestors had got a better bargain from Lochiel on his farm than was usual because it lay on the confines of Glengarry's lands and he was the head of the Tribe of the MacPhees from whom personal service was expected.

Alexander MacPhee was also tenant of the Forest Grazings and stated that his ancestors and he himself were Keepers of Corrybuy, which was the Nursery or principal part of it, viz, Corryrea, Lubnacallich and Corrynagaule.

Evidently the MacPhees were much trusted by the Lochiels to guard the marches with Glengarry's lands. The term 'Nursery' is unusual, and is now, so far as I know, out of use. It means 'a place where animal life is fostered or promoted' in this case, and the term now in use is 'Deer Sanctury'.

McVee is synonymous with MacPhee, and during the time of Prince Charles's wanderings after Culloden a man of that name, Ewen McVee, a Cameron Clansman, behaved with outstanding courage and loyalty. He had been entrusted with some letters of the greatest secrecy and importance by a French officer who was seeking for the Prince, and was apprehended in Kintail. General Blackeney, commander of the Hanoverian troops at Inverness was most anxious to find out what McVee knew, where he had got the letters, and to whom he was taking them. Writing to Lord Albemarle, Blackeney stated, 'He will not confess anything though he received this morning one hundred good lashes with a Cat o' Nine Tails.' In cold and starvation Ewen McVee died not long after in the Inverness Tolbooth. His brief sojurn there aroused much interest among the townsfolk, eager for any news of the Prince; and an Inverness Minister took note of McVee's answer to the fellow-prisoner who called him a great fool for notdisclosing what he knew. 'You are the fool, 'McVee replied in his native language, 'It signifies nothing what they can do to me - let them do their worst - in respect of what could be done to those from whom I had come and to whom I was going with the letters. Their deaths would be a great loss, but mine will be none. * **

Another Ewen MacPhee, not to be mistaken for the Jacobite here, was a wellknown outlaw who latterly lived on an island in Loch Quoich, known as MacPhee's Island. He was a deserter from the army and lived in concealment at Feddan until his hiding place was made known to the military who took him unawares and captured him. He was put on a steamer at Corpach, but just as it was leaving the pier he bent down, snapped his handcuffs against an iron bar and was off. For two years he hid about the woods on Locharkaigside and then moved to Eilean Mhic Phee where he built himself a bothy and took unto himself a wife. When Mr Edward Ellice first came to Glenquoich, Ewen MacPhee paid him a visit, appearing as usual in Highland dress. Mr Ellice asked him by

what right he lived on the island; for answer, Ewen drew his dirk and, plunging it into the table, said, 'By this right I have kept it and by this right I will hold it.' Many stories are told of his sheep stealing proclivities and his brushes with the Sheriff officers. Eventually he was captured and imprisoned where he died. ***

ISTHERE A TOUCHOF TARIANIN THE FAMILY TREE?



THE COURT of the Lord Lyon, Scotland, has recently received a considerable number of inquiries from Australians and New Zealanders wanting research done in Scotland. An official of the Court has provided this guide to the services available:

We explain that the Court does not undertake to make researches, though the public registers and other collections of the Lyon Office will be made available at search fees for each particular search of 50 np. in the Register of Arms or 1 pound in the Register of Genealogies. The fee for a general search in the Heraldic and Genealogical MSS or other collections of the department will be 5 pounds. For this you will require to employ a searcher at a professional fee. The Scots Ancestry Research Society, 20 York Place, Edinburgh, EH1 3EP, has a staff of searchers who can be invoked.

For more specialised antiquarian research, the names could be supplied of one or two expert record searchers, for whose work, however, this department is in no way responsible.

The Association of Genealogists & Record Agents can also supply lists of searchers to undertake research in Scotland.

The Court does not undertake to supply individual replies to questions regarding (a) name (origins, etc.); (b) sept; or (c) tartan; for which reference should be made to the appropriate chapters of reliable books.

The Court and Office of the Lord Lyon deals only with tartans and septs when these matters are brought up on petition (or steps incidental to petitions) for judicial or official pronouncement, on which the relative Government dues are exigible, and detailed evidence and proof is required.

THERE ARE numerous armigerous people living in Australia today, as there have been in the past.

Obviously, these fall into two classes: those who were entitled to arms granted to their ancestors in Great Britain; and those who applied for arms after they or their ancestors arrived in the colony.

Of the former, they would as a whole have been descendants of the nobility, gentry or merchant classes. Details of the arms can generally be found in Burke's Peerage, Baronage and Knightage or Landed Gentry, although there are many more not included.

The only authoritative answer can be given by the College of Arms in London, the Court of the Lord Lyon in Scotland or the Chief Herald of Ireland in Dublin.

Another series, Burke's Colonial Gentry, which covers most parts of the British Empire, includes not only armigerous people with established relationships to armigerous families in England, but also people granted arms after arriving in the colonies.

The first grant of arms in Australia was to the diocese of Australia (Church of England) in 1836.

The first personal grant was made to Thomas Icely, of Coombing Park, Carcoar, NSW, in December 1840.

Icely was a Justice of the Peace. a member of the Legislative Council in the Colony of NSW, and a landowner.

The arms granted to him are interesting, because he had used them for some time prior to the grant. They embody, with some variations, arms recorded for Thomas Isley of Gondridge, Kent, shown in the Visitation of Kent by Thomas Benoult in 1531.

While Icely's ancestors came

from Kent, there was no established relationship between the two men.

Another early grant in NSW was to the Clark-Irvings of Ashby Park.

In South Australia, the earliest grant was to Benjamin Graham of Prospect, one of the founders and first directors in the SA Mining Association at Burra Copper Mines

In Victoria, the first grant was to the pastoralist Henry Creswick lafter whom the town of Creswick, near Ballarat, was named) in 1856.

In 1874, the first Tasmanian grant was made to the Fyshe family. The grantee was the future Sir Phillip vshe.

He was Colonial Treasurer at the time of the grant but was later to be Premier of Tasmania and Postmaster-General in the Federal Government.

In Queensland, the first arms were granted to Francis Claudius Brodriff of Wallah, Toowoomba, in January 1892.

In Western Australia, the first grant was made in 1877 to Sir Luke Samuel Leake.

This included a grant to his brother George, father of Sir George Leake, KCMG, a Premier of

Since then there have been numerous grants to Australians and New Zealanders. Many of these are recorded in C. Low's A Roll of Australian Arms, which also records many corporate arms of banks, merchant corporatives, municipalities and episcopal grantees.

THE SALARY that Theodore Jones earns as a family doctor on a small Scottish island is only a fraction of what he used to make when he worked in the States.

But he cannot remember when he has ever been happier.

For life on the Hebridean island of Mull (pop. 1700), is so enriching, he says, that he would not

dream of going back to the bright lights of New York. Doctor Jones, who is 57 and married with five children, gave up a prosperous career as a surgeon and lecturer in America to settle down as a family doctor at Salen, near Tobermory

"The quality of life here is something money can't buy,"

he said. "I reckon I've got one of the best little general prac-tices in the world.

"Apart from the satisfaction of knowing all my patients personally. I love every aspect of island life, from sailing my yawl and fishing for mackerel to singing in the Gaelic choir and donning the McPhee tartan which I'm entitled to wear."

Doctor Jones, whose ancestors emigrated to America generations ago from the small isle of Colonsay, off Mull, first visited Scotland during the Second World War when he was a U.S. Air Force pilot seconded to the RAF. "Apart from the satisfac-

Later, he studied medicine Later, he studied medicine at Cornell medical school, New York—but never forgot the beauty of Scotland or the friendliness of the people.

Then as a top surgeon at the University of Rochester on take Ontario, he "suddenly woke up to a hankering."

What I really wanted to be was an old-fashioned doctor with a single-handed practice in a small community.

be was an old-fashioned doctor with a single-handed practice in a small community.

"A G.P. in the U.S.A. requires several thousand patients to make ends meet. I discussed things with my wife. Ann, and we decided Scotland would be ideal."

So, in 1973 Doctor Jones, a keen amateur sailor, left his family and set sail from New York in his 35 foot yawl Aries with a home-bound Briton and two American friends as crew. He spent two years at a Paisley hospital, then a year in a group practice at Girvan. "By that time my wife and two children had joined me. Then the job of a family doctor on Mull came up—and I got it. I got it.
"I have no regrets and my wife loves it on Mull."
