

CLAN COMMANDER DR. EARLE DOUGLAS MACPHEE



EARLE DOUGLAS MacPHEE
M.M. M.A.; M. Ed.; LL.D.; D.U.C.; D.C.L.

Born: Lower Millstream, New Brunswick, Canada on 19th July, 1894.

Married: Jennie Minerva Steeves in Canada on 28th December, 1920.

Died: 25th September, 1982, Vancouver B.C. Canada.

With great sorrow I record the death of Clan Macfie Commander, Dr. Earle Douglas MacPhee of Vancouver, Canada. We all know something of Earle's selfless and untiring efforts in leading our Clan back from a broken clan (in 1623) to official recognition in May 1981 as an active clan once again. Some of our members have had the privilege of meeting this great man; all will look on him as a true friend.

I still remember Peter Price, a fellow Air Force Air Traffic Control Officer at RAAF Base, Richmond, N.S.W., drawing my attention to a Letter to the Editor in The Australian newspaper some time in 1973. The letter was from Earle seeking contacts with "Macfies" in Australia. I replied as I had been researching my McPhie family since I was based at RAAF Williamtown north of Newcastle in 1968-69. I had found a host of information on my ancestors in the East Maitland CPS records, and located an impressive memorial to Angus McPhie, one of my 'great uncles', in East Maitland cemetry, other family gravestones in the Hinton cemetry, and the site of the original family farm house (circal846) on some not very productive country near Woodville. This was all conveyed to Earle who then admitted that he really wanted to see a Clan "Macfie" Society started in Australia.

It is history now that my friend Brian in Adelaide could duck faster than I could and so on 3rd May, 1974 I had pleasure in seeing the (then) McPhee Clan of Australia (Society) come into being as a result of Earle's request. I have three very thick files of correspondence with Earle; we didn't always agree - in fact some Canadians

of some significance took me to task early in the piece for having the temerity to disagree with Earle on some items of no great importance - but we always worked together to progress Clan Macfie matters. It is a point of great sadness that I never had the chance to meet him.

Earle was a sawmiller and a teacher early on, he served in the First World War and won a Military Medal, attended University in Edinburgh after the war and held various University posts in Canada from 1921 to 1929. Earle entered the business world in 1929 and worked at executive level with a number of firms, statutory bodies, and government instrumentalities. In World War II he held an important post with Short Bros, aircraft manufacturers in England. He returned to the academic life in 1950, holding a number of chairs in commercial disciplines at various Universities. His interest in and service with semi-government bodies continued throughout this time as did his prolific writing.

According to Earle's autobiography he retired in 1963, but really there's no evidence of this. He was honoured by the academic world in 1981 when the Senate of the University of British Columbia established a Chair of Management in the Faculty of Commerce and Business Administration and named it The Earle Douglas MacPhee Chair. He retained an involvement in all affairs until the end.

In 1969 Earle commenced his work for Clan Macfie. As a pre-requisite for official recognition as an active clan, it was necessary to record the history of our clan, in particular that covering the period since the clan was broken in 1623, and to form representative societies of our clan in areas of significant clan population. Earle did this. The calling of the first recorded Parliament of Clan Macfie in Edinburgh in May 1981 bears tribute to his untiring efforts and unswerving leadership. Clan Macfie Societies from Sweden, U.S.A., Canada, Australia, Scotland and New Zealand were represented at this Parliament. Official recognition of this clan unity came at this time too when the Lord Lyon King of Arms acknowledged Clan Macfie as "an honourable community."

Earle was invested as the first Ceann-Cath or Clan Commander of Clan Macfie on 6th November, 1981 - a fitting tribute to an exceptional man who had devoted many years of his life to His Clan.

It is most disappointing to me that Earle and Jennie were unable to visit Australia later this year. But those things must be. It is a point of great pride to me that I have been able to help Earle with his work for The Clan. I will always treasure my memories of this.

The sympathy of all members of The Macfie Society of Australia has been extended to Mrs. MacPhee, Jennie, and to their family.

There's a fund of information on certificates

Q: Could you please tell me what in-formation is contained in English Civil Registration certificates and also full details on what information has been given in Scottish certificates since the date registration began. I recently obtained an English death certificate and found the information didn't help me much. - J. J. Gingell, Esplanade, St Kilda, Vic.

A:THE INFORMATION given on English certificates (which covers

Wales) is:

Date and place of birth, name and sex of child, father's name, rank or profession, mother's name and maiden name.

Informant's signature, description and residence; further names added

after registration.

Death Date and place of death, name, sex, age, occupation, cause of death. Signature, description and residence of informant.

Marriage

Date and place of marriage, names of parties, age (full) conjugal status, occupation, residence at time of marriage, fathers' names and occupations, rites used.

Civil registration began in Scotland later than in England and it was not until 1855 that Scottish law required it. However, the details the registration gives is far superior to that in England, Wales and Ireland.

The amount of information given in all certificates is astonishing. Unfortunately, it was decided that the difficulties of obtaining in every case this full information made it impracticable: the details required were reduced in 1856 and these were again slightly modified and improved in 1861. From then on the registration details have remained virtually the same, only the marriage certificate being slightly altered in

The details given in the various certificates in 1855 are:

The name and baptismal name, if different; sex; year, date of month and hour of birth; place of birth (if in lodgings, so stated); father's name, rank, profession or occupation, his of month and hour of death; place changes to English certificates.



CERTIFICATES lodged by wedding groups can provide details of family history.

he was married and his other issue, both living and deceased; the mother's name and maiden name, her age and birthplace. The signature of the father, mother or other informant, and residence if out of the house in which the birth occurs; when and where registered and the signature of the Registrar.

The date and place of the marriage and in what form the marriage took place; and for both bride and bridegroom the present and usual residence; age, rank, or profession and, if related, the relationship of the parties; status (widow or widower, and if so whether second or third marriage and the number of children by each former marriage, living and deceased); birthplace, and when and where registered; the names with the rank, profession or occupation of both the parents in each case; if a regular marriage, the signature of the officiating minister and of the witnesses, or if irregular, the date of the extract, sentence or conviction or decree of declarator and in what court pronounced; the date and place of registration and signature of the Registrar.

Death

The name, rank, profession or occupation; sex and age; place of birth and length of time in the district of the deceased; names, ranks, professions or occupations of both parents: if deceased was married, the wife's name, the issue in order of birth, both living and deceased, their names and ages; the year, date

age and birthplace; when and where | of death, cause and how long the disease continued, medical attendant certifying and when he last saw the deceased; burial place and name of undertaker certifying it; signature of informant (usually mentioning relationship if related); date and place of registration and signature of the Registrar.

The birth certificates from 1856 to 1860 omit the age and birthplace of the parents and details of their marriage and details of any other issue. In the certificate of 1861 onwards the date and place of the parent's

marriage is included.

In the marriage certificate 1856 to 1860 the heading "Residence" is substituted for "Residence, Present, Usual", and details of any former marriage and issue and the birthplace of the parties are ommitted.

From 1861 the information is largely the same, the heading "Residence" being altered to the more useful "Usual Residence". In the 1922 certificates the information is similar, except that the names of the parties, in addition to their signatures, are given in full, the only information being omitted is the relationship, if any, of the bride to the bridegroom.

The death certificate from 1856 to 1860 omits the deceased's place of birth and details of any marriage and its issue. From 1861 the information is in effect the same, except that burial place and the undertaker's certification are not included.

MEMBERS LETTERS

Dorothy McPhee (Q77-327) of Crawshay Street, Bell in Queensland has produced a fine booklet setting out the family trees of the various descendants of Angus McPhee and Christina McTavish who arrived in Moreton Bay on the SS "Caroline" on 17th November, 1853. It covers five generations and contains 16 pages of carefully detailed lineage charts.

In a covering letter Dorothy mentioned:

"On the SS "Caroline" which docked in Moreton Bay on November 17th 1853 there were other McPhee passengers viz: John McPhee, aged 39, a crofter of Argyle and son of Malcolm and Janet (decd.). With him were his wife, Ann, aged 35, daughter of Angus and Isabella Cameron (decd.) and their children Isabella, 15, Malcolm, 14, Jepie (as far as can be deciphered) aged 12, Isabel 6, and Catherine, 1. Both John and Ann had cousins in Sydney.

Angus and Christina had come from Argyle also. It would be interesting to know where John and Ann McPhee went to and where their descendants are now."

Ron McPhee (V77-300) of 82 Fernside Ave., Briar Hill, Vic. 3088 writes:

"After a long search, I have finally found my Great Grandparents Death Certificates, Angus and Euphemia McPhee.
Then I read the August edition of the Historical and Genealogical notes with interest, re, of Angus McPhee, who with his wife and family, arrived in Melbourne on 24/2/1853, on board "Priscilla". Eureka! I thought, I had found my long lost cousins. But, it was not to be.
My McPhee's also arrived in the "Priscilla".

According to Melbourne Shipping Records, about 8 Angus McPhee's arrived in Melbourne in 1853, including these two on the same ship.

Through the newsletter, I would like to try to trace other descendants of "MY" Angus and Euphemia McPhee, (nee McLeod).

My Grandfather, Angus was born in Broadford, in 1857.
According to my Great Grandmothers Death Certificate, she died in 1884, 67 years old, and buried at Broadford, Vic. There were 6 surviving children, out of 9. John 44, Euphemia 39, Christina 34, Mary 30, and Angus 29. (As previously mentioned, my Grandfather).

John received a grant of land near Euroa, Vic. in 1870, his descendents still farm the land."

LEST WE FORGET

In Newsbulletin No. 32 (Nov 81) the names of Clan Macfie members appearing on the Roll of Honour at the Australian War Memorial were recorded for the Soudan (1883), Boer War (1899/02), Boxer Rebellion (1900/01) and World War I (1914/18) (in part).

The remaining names for World War I are given below along with those for World War II, Korea, the Malay Emergency, Confrontation and Vietnam. No names are available for service in Russia in 1919 as Australian troops participating in that conflict were discharged in England and then enlisted in British units before departing for Russia.
