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De VANE MIDDLETON'S CALL FOR CLAN FUNDS

De Vane Middleton of Lake in the Woods, Guyton, Ga, 31312, U.S.A., was appointed International Treasurer of Clan Macfie in 1981. He was tasked to examine the financial needs of the Clan and develop ways and means of meeting these needs.

He considers two funds are necessary. One to meet day to day running expenses of an administrative nature incurred by the Clan Commander. The other, to establish a Clan Capital Fund with only the interest from this fund being available for use and that, for special Clan purposes.

The day to day monies would be met by a per capita levy on Clan Society members, while the Capital Fund would be built up by donations from Clan Members. The funds would be administered by a financial committee established for that purpose.

Your Executive examined these proposals and endorsed them in principle. However, we had already decided in January 1982 that we would pay an annual levy of 20% of membership subscriptions collected to defray a Clan Commander's expenses and accordingly, this will continue. It should be noted though, that a lesser amount will be paid (as at present) to the central international authority when no Clan Commander has been appointed.

The Executive also decided that a call would be made for donations by Clan members to the Clan Capital Fund. They can be of any size and forwarded at anytime to Clan Society Secretary, Helen McPhie in Toowoomba. Why not add a little when paying your subscription? To assist in the establishment of this fund, the Executive decided to forward A\$100 as a donation from members of The Macfie Clan Society of Australia.

A SOUGHT AFTER AUSTRALIAN RECIPE

We are in debt to a gracious Lady in Camberra for the following recipe:

Flo's Pumpkin Scones

1 tablespoon butter	1 egg
2 cups S.R. flour	½ cup sugar
1 cup mashed pumplin	teaspoon salt

Put butter, sugar and salt in mixmaster; then add egg followed by mashed pumpkin. Finally add by hand the sifted self-raising flour. Do not handle mixture too much, and cook in a very hot ove (250°C or 450°F) for 15 to 20 minutes.

If the pumpkin is very dry you may need two tablespoons of milk.

PUBLIC ACCESS TO PRE 1900 BIRTH, DEATH & MARRIAGE RECORDS IN VICTORIA

Until recently Victoria was the only State in Australia which had not released to public access its pre 1900 civil registration indexes for births, deaths and marriages. Additionally, the price of certified copies of these certificates was increased last year to \$18 per copy making them amongst the most expensive in the world.

As a result of submissions made to the Minister for Property and Services in Victoria, Mr Jack Simpson, M.P., by the Society of Australian Genealogists and many of its members, Mr Simpson has taken steps to enable the filming of pre 1900 records to provide public access and has set fees for these certificates at \$5 for search plus \$5 for the issue of a certificate.

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CLAN SOCIETY MEMBERSHIP IN SOUTH AUSTRALIA

Clan Society membership in South Australia is not large when compared with that in Victoria or New South Wales. But it has something which the other States do not have and that is a large number of family memberships where parents and children in the one family are all members.

When the South Australian members were asked for a Newsbulletin article on Family Membership, they expressed surprise that the position was different in other States. South Australia Vice-President, Brian McHaffie and his members felt that if we do not encourage interest amongst our youngsters then the Clan can never expand or prosper. It was also felt that youngsters would appreciate an association with a 'family' with a long history and that by so doing they would never need to feel alone.

It is worth thinking about - and certainly is no more expensive having a family membership when your children are with you at home. On the larger scale, we should surely always be pleased to make contact with "Macfies" who we meet for the first time - they're not a bad lot - but regretably, experience especially overseas, has shown that this contact is not always received as cordially as was expected by some of our members.

O'Phee Industries sign \$100m China deal

Pittsworth engineering firm O'Phee Industries' 20-year contract with a Chinese company could be worth \$100 million in today's terms.

General manager of O'Phee Industries Mr Ray Wilms released details of the contract yesterday

after returning from China.

The deal involves supplying
O'Phee designed and manufactured semi-trailer equipment in kit form to the Chinese Government.

The initial contract is for two years, with an on-going contract for 20 years involving the transfer

of technology and management expertise

Mr Wilms said the first year would be worth \$8 million to O'Phee Industries.

He said based on today's prices, the 20-year contract could be worth more than \$100 million.

The O'Phee contract was won after representations were made by the Toowoomba-based Agres International Consultants at the Agro-China Trade Fair in November last year.

Mr Wilms and Mr Geoff Wormwell, principal of Agres

Consultants, returned from China this week to outline the first stages in supplying the Chinese firm with semi-trailer kits.

Initial sales for the first year are

for 200 units at \$20,000 each.
One of the more significant developments of the contract is that O'Phee's will be supervising production design and standards as the kits are introduced to the Chinese market.

Mr Wilms said the contract would initially increase staffing needs at the Pittsworth plant by 50

Prisoners of the waves

WHEN THE thrice-weekly beet which has just brought you to Colonsay, or which you have just missed, steams off beck to Oban, two-and-a-half hours away, you should ponder either the peculiar advantages of your situation, or the enormity of it. On the one hand you are part of a small, select and static holiday community which would fit easily into a jumbo jet. On the other, there is no escape for three days.

Your only mistake may have been to bring your car. As the village shop wisely notes, there is no earthly reason to take a vehicle to Colonsay, unless you are disabled. Anyone capable of reaching the corner shop at home could walk the ten mile long island in a week.

After feet and bikes, by far the most sensible conveyance is harbour-master Peter Macallister's boat. Holding grimly to the engine housing—and occasionally, by mistake, to the vertical exhaust pipe—I was ferried through towering seas to Seal island, a rocky afterthought to Oransay, itself a full-stop to Colonsay's exclamation mark.

The attraction is expressed in the name. In September and October the island is an open maternity ward for one of the largest colonies of grey seals in Scotland. Each cove contains an anxious mother and her litter of white furred pups. Apart from men with guns, the baby seals have only a single enemy, the sea otter. In driving rain we inspect its residence—three entrance holes behind a platform of peat. Peter Macallister was not enthusiastic: "I like seals fine, but not etters—they eat chickens."

Seal-basking territory extends all around Oransay. On a balmier September morning, mothers-in-waiting sunbathed under the alumbering eye of a great old sack of a bull, heads turning occasionally as if in conversation. One seal lazed, tail-upturned, on a bed of seaweed, delaying its ungainly waddle to the sea until I was almost on top of it. Minutes later, its head reappeared from the water like a grizzled old Channel-swimmer, completing its study of a rare visitor.

Ashore, Oransay's main distinction lies in its significance as a burial place for bishops. It must have staged some impressive funerals. In addition to disconcerting little heaps of bones in niches, the ruined priory contains an outstanding display of early carved tomb-

stones. But the single most impressive burial site on the islands was claimed by an unnamed Viking, in a grassy bank at the head of Kiloran Bay on Colonsay. An odd choice for a pagan as the bay, which extends a third of the way into the island and finishes with a magnificent bank of sand, points straight at the holy island of Iona.

TRAVEL

Colonsay's greatest gift to the visitor is the illusion of adventure. It invites the most reckless feats of exploration with no chance of losing oneself. One foray to the north took me through a switchback of swampy valleys and craggy moorland in the vague direction of the top of the island. I improvised a route through snatches of ancient Caledonian forest and across fingers of rock jutting into a boiling sea. Over one hillock, six horned heads swivelled to watch me go by—wild goats said to be of Spanish

origin, descendants of survivors from a wrecked Armada ship. As soon as I imagined myself lost, I would climb a crag to behold the whole of the north of the island, spread before my feet, the sea seldom more than three miles away in any direction. In the distant west blinked the Du Hirteach lighthouse, the only point between the island and Canada; to the east the majestic heights of Islay and Mull.

Colonsay tries to maintain its raw purity through a ban on caravans (one arrived while I was there to serve as a retirement home for a returning islander, causing great consternation). Camping is disallowed too. And there are no official signs to spoil the view, not even road signs. The island is small enough for interested people to watch closely for any decline in its environment. On two long treks I counted only four pieces of litter, not counting shoreline detritus.

There is one hotel on the island, the Colonsay, served by

the estimable Kevin and Christa Byrne, whose guests are whisked the quarter-mile from the quay in a former London taxi. The hotel is noteable for three things: the table d'hote menu based on the produce of the garden; the wine list which offers the same price mark-up on every bottle, ensuring that the best wines are the best value; and two Irish terriers which rollick delightedly on their backs whenever anyone shows the slightest interest.

Holidays in Colonsay tend to

Holidays in Colonsay tend to be extended, or to have their start delayed, by a conspiracy of wind and waves which leaves the ferry stranded in whatever port it had reached before the storm broke. The trick is to arrange a visit over Christmas: Hogmanay here lasts for twelve days.

Colonsay can be reached only by the Caledonian MacBrayne ferry, which sails three times weekly from Oban: Friday at 20.00. The same boat returns on Friday evening, and early Tuesday and Thursday, The journey takes about two-and-a-half hours, for a fare of £9.90 return. There is limited accommodation for cars. Details from Caledonian MacBrayne, The Pier, Gourock (tel. 0475 33755).
