MELBOURNE DINNER

Thirty two members attended the Clan Dinner in Melbourne on Friday, 8th November. A most enjoyable evening at Chaucers in Canterbury, organised by Victoria Vice-President Bruce McPhie, with special visitors Clan Society President Sandy McPhie and Secretary Helen travelling down from Toowoomba.

After an excellent meal Bruce showed some slides from his recent visit to Scotland for the Clan Macfie Gathering. ONE of Australia's biggest private enterprises has set up shop in Geelong.

McPhee interstate freight distribution opened a Geelong branch office a month ago in keeping with its policy of extending services into regional centres.

An accomplished interstate capital city parcel express service, McPhee's goal is to establish a total Australian link up.

McPhee's Geelong manager, Mr Barry Tennant, said the firm was Australia's largest privately owned transport company.

"We have recently set up other regional branches in Victoria, New South Wales and on a smaller scale in South Australia," Mr Tennant said.

Victoria's regional branches included Bendigo, Ballarat, Warrnambool, Albury — Wodonga and Warragul.

McPhee was founded in 1923 when John McPhee senior, the grandfather of the current managing director, started a local delivery service on Sydney's North Shore.

One of McPhee's biggest claims to fame is its nomination by Target Australia as its preferred carrier.

"Target is happy that we've set up a branch in Geelong and so close to their head office operations," Mr Tennant said.

"We can offer a door-to-door delivery service from capital city to capital city, regional centre to regional centre or a combination.

"Overnight deliveries can be made from Geelong to Sydney or Adelaide, two days to Brisbane and four days to Perth."

Mr Tennant said McPhee used its own fleet of delivery vehicles and the only other mode of transport used was the firm's own plane.

The plane based at Essendon Airport is used for twice daily flights to Launceston.

THE BEST LAID PLANS

The Scottish Australian Heritage Council which conducts the highly successful Scottish Week in Sydney each year will no doubt, not mind our repeating this delightful story of just how the best laid plans went entirely wrong at their Race Day last year:

or farmers, the equation about the harder you work, the more money you make, doesn't necessarily follow. Their incomes are determined by a complex combination of the weather, government

charges and tariffs, and whether the rest of us choose to eat and drink local

products or imports.

Dairy farmer Pat McPhie, 42, of Warragul, Victoria, wasn't prepared to sit back and watch her family's income plummeting. She started organizing cheese drives - in place of the usual lamingtons or chocolates - and getting farmers to promote local products in supermarkets.

Pat, a former teacher, who has been farming for 20 years, and her husband Don, who took over from his parents, say they can't remember when things

were tougher.

So Pat, as president of the Warragul Technical School Parents' Association, revved up the local community with a cheese drive involving local factories. They sold \$3400 of cheese in a couple of weeks.

Pat has now worked out a set of guidelines for a successful cheese drive and she's passing them around

(says dairy farmer Pat McPhie)

She believes 'local is best' and is organizing cheese promotions by farmers to prove her point

to the many other groups in the community who have approached her.

Until last year, like most farmers, Pat quietly got on with the job, looked after her children Dale, 17, Janet 14, Helen, 10, and Kim, 7, and told herself things would get better.

Her discontent came to a head when local dairy factories paid farmers an opening price for the season of \$2.50 a kilo for butter fat.

That's pretty well what it costs us to produce it," says Pat, who is fiercely articulate. "It means there's nothing left after food and running costs, so you just have to hope nothing breaks down.

The McPhie's have 73 hectares and they milk around 100 cows. "Our income was down \$12,000 last year on the year before.'

Then Pat noticed a local supermarket had several tables of imported cheese on special for about a month.

"I got madder and madder," she

says. "They expect us to support them, but they were doing nothing for us.

So she organized a petition of 90 signatures from local farmers, threatening to take their business elsewhere unless those imports

were moved.

The supermarket told us local cheeses don't sell because they are dearer than imports, which are subsidized, and there isn't the variety."

So, with the consent of the manager and local cheese factories, and husband and wife farmer teams working two-hour shifts, Pat organized her own local cheese promotion.

"We increased Australian cheese

sales 740 percent in a week," she says. Two weeks later she did the same thing in a rival store and their sales went up 871 percent. Word got around about Pat's success, and inquiries came from all over Australia.

"I'd like people to check labels carefully before they buy," says Pat.

She is not about to give up the fight for farmers. She was recently made the first woman committee member of the Australian Jersey Breeders Society, after more than 80 years.

GENERAL NOTES


