Sixteen members attend the Sixth Biennial General Meeting of the Clan Society in Adelaide on 25th January 1986. A copy of the Meeting Minutes and Reports is enclosed with this Newsbulletin. Thirty-six members and friends attended the Clan Dinner at the South Park Motor Inn on the evening following the Biennial General Meeting, while sixteen members were present the following day for a Clan Picnic in Rymill Park in central Adelaide. Both were most enjoyable functions - no doubt the good "Macfie" company helped.

Ten members travelled from inter-State for the week-end. A mini-raffle was held in conjunction with the General Meeting with first prize of a copy of John Prebble's The Highland Clearances (donated by Victoria Vice-President Bruce McPhie) going to Ted Smythe and second prize of a Macfie tartan tie (donated by President Sandy McPhie) going to Ian McPhee.

Finances for the week-end worked out at \$882 square for the Dinner and a profit of \$19 from the mini-raffle.

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LODER'S "COLONSAY & ORONSAY"

One of the best books about Colonsay is John de vere Loder's "Colonsay & Oronsay In the Isles of Argyll". Unfortunately it was printed some fifty years ago and has been virtually unobtainable since the sixties.

GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL NOTES

Mrs Gwen Jarvis (V83-527) of Dandenong, Vic., recently forwarded a copy of a talk she gave to the Dandenong Historical Society about the life of her late father, Charles Carey McPhee. The following brief account has been taken from that copy.

Charles McPhee was born at Majorca near Maryborough, Vic. on 14th March, 1888. His parents were Robert Alexander McPhee and Mary King of Dunolly, Vic. - Robert being a baker - and in due course, moving to Melbourne and Tenango. Charles was the second oldest in a family of nine children.

In 1910 he trained as a Minister for the Methodist Church and served at Pakenham, Yallock, Bacchforest and Bruthen in Victoria during the following years. He joined the A.I.F. in 1916 and saw service as a sergeant in France with the 24th Machine Gun Coy of the 4th Australian Division. The trip to Europe taking two months by troopship.

He was gassed, wounded and finally captured by the Germans in the battle for Dernancourt in April 1918. Although far from well during his time as a prisoner, Charles McPhee became well known for assisting his fellow prisoners. Liberated in mid-November he was eventually returned to Australia on 26th August 1919.

Following discharge from the Army, Charles trained as an electrician and went into business with his brother Arch. He married Doris Savage of Yallock at the Dandenong Methodist Church on 1st November 1919. They had five children Joyce, Gwen, Roy (Bill), Sylvia and Jessie. Charles continued as a lay preacher of the Methodist Church throughout his active life.

When the Second World War broke out he was deemed to be too old to enlist so Charles served with the Y.M.C.A. in military areas in rural Victoria before going to Darwin and Mataranka.

In his latter years he wintered in north Queensland for health reasons - particularly around Tully and Cairns. Charles passed away in Melbourne on 29th May 1957 following a full and active life. (See photo page 7).

LONDON LETTER

Scottish-Swedish Marine Artist

WHILE HOLIDAYING in Scandinavia last year I bought with delight a beautifully illustrated history of sailing ships, and I also noted that the artist, though "billed" as Swedish, bore the distinctly Scottish name of Gordon Macfie. Recently these same illustrations have been reproduced here in larger-scale in Sail Through The Centuries (Hugh Evelyn: 2 vols. each 55s.), one of those Evelyn series of fine, large, coloured lithographs which so lovingly record early railway-engines, vintage cars and other manmade masterpieces. They are now available as single prints at 7s. 6d. for framing.

So, by correspondence, I set out to interview Mr. Macfie, who replied from one of the islands of the Swedish skärgard. As one would expect, his record proved him an extremely well-known marine artist, with pictures in most of the principal collections in Sweden, including the King's collection.

Gordon Macfie is indeed a Scot, by descent, from the Colonsay Macfies. In 1948 he spent some months in Scotland. "It was a wonderful experience to spend a time in the clan's ancient islands of Colonsay and Oronsay," he wrote to me, "As a legend and saga they had always been known to us, and one of the first memories of my childhood was the map of the Western Highlands in my grandfather's room, on which the islands of Colonsay and Oronsay were shown in Macfie tartan. But it took 37 years before I managed to reach the islands."

Gordon Macfie's great-great-great-grandfather, who spoke only Gaelic, left the islands for Campbeltown. His son, Captain James Macfie, owned Garhallow Lodge in Dunoon, but was lost with all hands in the brig Garland: his wife waited in vain at the window for thirty years.

It was his son-Gordon Macfie's great-grandfather, William Andrew Macfie of the Macfie Sugar Refining Company of Greenock, who married Jessie Thorburn of Leith and in 1823 accompanied the Thorburns, another noted Scottish-Swedish family, to Uddevalla in west Sweden. He introduced curling to Sweden. Andrew Macfie, grandfather to Gordon, was a sea captain and author of five books; his father, Harry Macfie, who died seven years ago, adventured as trapper and gold-prospector in Canada and Alaska as a young man, and returned to Sweden, where he wrote eleven books, including the often-translated Wasawasa-an Indian word meaning "far-away"-which is published in England by Allen and Unwin.

Gordon Macfie himself, born in 1910, before turning to his career as an artist, sailed for some years in American and Swedish ships, including six months as deckboy in the Swedish three-masted tops'l schooner Ragnar of Viken and a short passage in the four-masted barque Passat: this knowledge and love of the sailing ships is apparent in every line he draws.

I asked him why he drew sailing ships in just this special way, which combines the eye of the artist with the technical accuracy of the sailor. "It was, I am sure, because we were brought up with the ships," Mr. Macfie wrote, "they were always in our hearts, they were our first great and true and everlasting love. The sailing ship is, as I feel it, together with the Parthenon and the Gothic cathedrals, a supreme art."

At the end of the letter he drew an exquisite little pen and ink drawing of "The Penang bound from Leith to Madagascar." That was in August, 1937, as I have cause to remember. I was on board the Penang at that very moment, outward bound on a voyage round the world.

WHISKY ORANGES WITH ATHOLL BROSE CREAM

8 oranges 4 cup sugar

½ cup water ¼ cup scotch whisky

3 tablespoons scotch whisky 3 tablespoons honey


Combine sugar and water in saucepan, stir until sugar dissolves. Bring to boil, reduce heat, simmer 2 minutes. Remove from heat, add whisky, cool. Remove rind from oranges, remove all white pith. Cut oranges into segments, cutting between membranes; do this over bowl, to catch all the juice. Put into bowl, pour cool syrup over, cover, refrigerate. To serve, spoon oranges and syrup into 6 individual serving dishes, top with Atholl Brose Cream.

ATHOLL BROSE CREAM

Whip cream softly. Put honey and whisky into bowl, stir until well combined. Gradually add whisky mixture to cream, beat until thick. Refrigerate until serving.

Note: The oranges can be prepared and put into whisky syrup several days before the dinner; they absorb the flavour of the syrup beautifully. Put oranges into bowl with syrup, cover firmly, refrigerate.

In his Preston home his father Mr Roy McPhee said his son has always been a down to earth person.

He does not boast about the international awards he has won, in-cluding the War Memo-rial Scholarship and the coveted Warner Memorial Medal - both of them firsts for an Australian citizen "He sends them all to us", said his father.

A high point in John McPhes's career was an industry lecture given at the Sydney Opera House.

That was a grand oc-casion for all involved. He had come a long way from his early years at the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organis-taion textile division in Geelong where he worked on various mappets of security line wood from 1951 than of it was in this early years at the CSIRO that he managed to go to Oxford.

After returning to complete the last four years of his contract with CSIRO in Australia, he returned to England to make his name internationally.

He has had hundreds of papers published on wool technology and has carried out major research projects in universities and vari-ous research institu-tions in England and abroad.

According to a leading England business writer, Mr Nigel Austin, it was his direction at Ilkley that "won the centre a reputation as one of the world's leading research and devel-opment organisations."

Dr McPhee, 53, attended West Preston Primary School and Coburg High School. He has a wife, Beryl, and two children, Greg, 21, and Laurie, 19.
