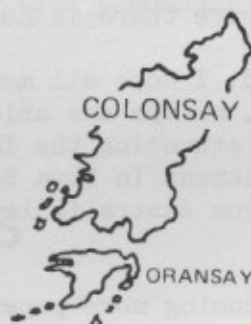

APPOINTMENT OF RON MacPHEE, HAWAII

Ron MacPhee of Hawaii has been appointed Chairman of the Executive Committee of Clan Macfie Armigers which was established to provide Clan leadership pending the appointment of a Clan Chief or Clan Commander.

Miss Syliva McPhee of Toronto is Ron's deputy with other members of the Committee being Rev. James Duffy (Scotland), Alf Hagman (Sweden), Graham Cathie (New Zealand), and Sandy McPhie (Australia).

Ron is a consulting engineer and though an American citizen, has close ties with Prince Edward Island, Canada and a great love for things Scottish. He and his wife Mert are members of our Clan Society (Z78-405 and 406) and have been regular visitors to Clan Gatherings in Scotland and North America.

A Clan Armiger since 1983, Ron is Chairman of the Clan Heraldry Committee. Ron founded The MacPhee Clan Society of the USA in 1983 and was the driving force in forming in 1985 the Federation of Clan MacDhubhshith Societies of the United States by bringing The Cathey Family Association of USA, The MacDuffee Clan of America Inc., and The MacPhee Clan Society of the USA together.

The ad hoc derbhfine of Clan armigers has therefore completed its task in relation to Clan leadership for the time being. It has however, adjourned its deliberations rather than disbanding as a body and thus can quickly resume session to again consider selection of a nominee for Clan Commander immediately circumstances warrant it.

MONUMENT**

Prince Charles Edward Stuart, "Bonnie Prince Charlie" landed there on 19th August, 1745 and launched his campaign to restore the Stuarts to the throne of Britain. There the proud red and white silk banner of the Stuarts was raised aloft by the Marquis of Tullibardine and blessed by Bishop Hugh MacDonald. King James VIII was solemnly proclaimed King of Great Britain and Ireland and Charles was appointed Regent. Declarations were made promising redress of grievances and restoration of lost rights and privileges.



From a handful of local Highlanders, Prince Charles' support grew rapidly that day. First to rally to the Prince's side was MacDonald of Morar with 150 of his Clansmen.

Noon brought to the anxious ears of the Prince the welcome sound of Lochiels' pipes, heralding the approach of 700 Camerons. Keppoch soon followed with 300 warlike MacDonells at his heels. When evening fell, the gallant Prince had a force of almost 1500 at his side.

We know this heroic beginning had its final tragic chapter written in Highlanders' blood on Culloden Moor near Inverness some eight months later where many Clan Macfie men fell, fighting with the Camerons beside the other Clans.

But at Glenfinnan, did you know that a Macfie was one of the two pipers to pipe Prince Charles ashore when he first landed? Or that the 65 foot monument there was commissioned in 1815 by the Macdonalds of Glenaladale? A Lanarkshire sculptor named Greenshields was engaged to do the statue of the Prince for the top. But he didn't know what Charles looked like and used a large painting in a local castle as a basis for his sketches. Unfortunately there were two paintings in the room - the other being of the owner of the castle, and yes, you've guessed it - the story goes that he copied the wrong painting and that's not Bonnie Prince Charlie atop the monument at all!

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# Their chief was saved by witchcraft

## CLAN SEPTS

CATHIE, DUFFIE, DUFFY, FEE, MACAFEE MACCOOISH, MACCUISH, MACGUFFIE, MACHAFFIE, MACVEE, MACVIE.

**T**HEIR dead lie in ancient tombs, immortalised as warriors and churchmen by the mysterious beauty of Celtic art found on Oronsay, their burial isle. This was the land of the MacPhees, who were lords of neighbouring Colonsay—*island chiefs and priors at a time when a Gaelic world of poetry, religion and music flourished with the Lords of the Isles.*

Later, much later, their dead were to lie on Culloden Moor without so much as a whin bush as a memorial.

No stone was laid to mark the spot where they fell in their gallant charge which nearly crushed the might of Cumberland's line.

This was the rise and the fall of the MacPhees—left broken and landless to become a race of wanderers.

The MacPhees (or MacFies) were anciently called MacDuffie, from "Mac Dubhsithe" — literally, "son of the black witchcraft." Curiously, black—always sinister among Gaels—is a colour which often appears in their history. (There is even a black and white set of the MacPhee tartan). Like a prophesy of their gloomy future, the colour haunts their folklore.

The "Black Dog of Murroch MacPhee" is a Gaelic folk-tale with many variations, but all versions seem to agree that a black dog was gifted to a MacPhee chief by a witch, who promised: "The black dog's day will come."

### TO THE RESCUE

On several hunting trips, Murroch tried every appeal to get the dog to accompany him; but the animal refused — until one day it willingly joined its master and his companions on an excursion to Islay. While camping in a cave, the party was attacked by a supernatural being so terrible it is described simply as "The Thing."

After this grotesque spirit had slain all the chief's companions it turned to attack the chief, but the black dog sprang to the rescue. "Every dog has his day" goes our English equivalent, for the black dog's day to save the chief's life had finally come!

The name Dubhsith appears early in Irish literature; and in 717 A.D. it is on record that one Duff Dakrich M'Duffie was slain at the battle of Kyndealgen, believed to have been in Dalriada. MacDuffies or MacPhees were in Colonsay as contemporaries with Somerled's grandson, Donald, who died in 1294.

By the time the Clan Donald had established their Gaelic kingdom, the MacPhees occupied their island lands as vassals of the Lords of the Isles.

MacPhees were hereditary keepers of the Records of the Isles and held court at Garvard, Colonsay. A prisoner appearing before the MacPhee judge would have the right of appeal to the Council of the Isles at the great manor house at Finlaggan, Islay.

There is a tradition that a MacPhee chief was at Bannockburn and there fought and overcame St Giles de Argentine.



Sir Walter Scott commemorated this event in "The Lord of the Isles," identifying the island chief as "MacDuffith, Lord of Colonsay."

During David II's reign (1329-1370), the Colonsay clansmen—armed only with thorn staves—fought the King's troops over some fiscal measure, getting the worst of the battle. They were buried where they fell, there on the strand; and until recent years superstitious island fishermen would refuse to dig bait at this spot for fear of evoking a curse from the dead.

A comprehensive genealogy of the MacPhees back through Cormac to a Celtic figure named Feredach is given in a 1450 manuscript; and 13 years later it is on record that Donald MacDuffie (MacPhee) accompanied John, 4th Lord of the Isles and Earl of Ross, to Dingwall to witness a charter.

### WEAKENED

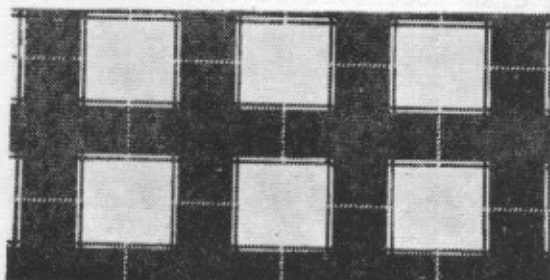
When the Lordship was forfeited in 1493, James IV made several expeditions to the west to enforce his royal authority over the old MacDonald vassals. He offered the chiefs Crown charters then revoked them, entrusting Argyll in the south and Huntly in the north with administrative powers. Later the granting of the same lands to rival chiefs led to clan feuds which further weakened the island clans and led to their eventual decline.

Colonsay and Oronsay lands were vested in the Crown. But the MacPhees continued to reside there, for in 1549 Sir Donald Munro, High Dean of the Isles, found Colonsay possessed "by one gentle captain called MacDuffie."

This was Murroch — probably the Murroch of the "Black Dog" episode.

In Oronsay at this time the prior was Sir Donald MacDuffie. Last Roman Catholic prior of this holy isle was appointed by Queen Mary in 1555, for in five years came the Reformation.

Shortly before the Union of the Crowns, a MacPhee was presented to the parsonage at Oronsay. This was Donald, who met with other chiefs and Bishop Knox at Iona to sign the "Statutes of Icolmkill," which insured the discipline of the Reformed Kirk and commanded every man having as many as six cattle to send his eldest child to the Lowlands to learn English. Bards and other "idlers of that class" were threatened with banishment.

Clan feuds during the sixteenth century often found MacPhees involved with the invading MacLeans from Mull, who — on one occasion—brought along a small cannon which made a noise like an exaggerated "coo-what." The Colonsay men called it the "cuat" or cuckoo and made a crude Gaelic joke of anyone unlucky enough to be injured by "the droppings of the cuckoo."

The "cuat" notwithstanding, MacPhees outfought and killed all the invaders save the MacLean chief, who fled in such panic he tried to reach his offshore galleys by swimming to meet them. But he was drowned. What became of the cannon, no one knows.

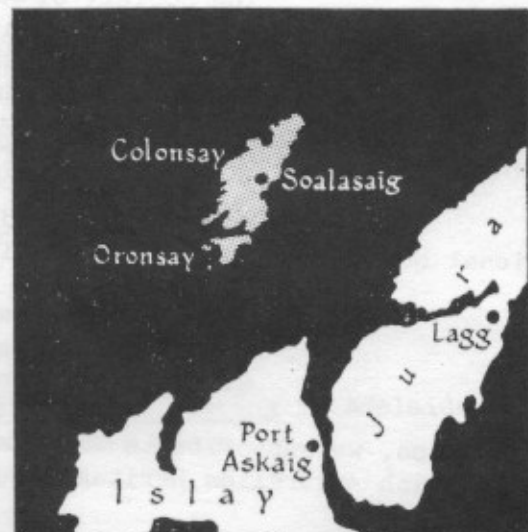
When Argyll took possession of Colonsay in 1610 and appointed his own factor, it was the beginning of the end. The MacPhee chief became little more than a gillie to the Campbells. His successor, Mal-

colm MacPhee, joined in the 1615 rebellion of Sir James MacDonald and was delivered to Argyll by Colla Ciotach ("Left-handed Coll"), known as Colkitto to the Lowlanders.

When Malcolm tried to escape he hid in shallow water, covering himself in seaweed; but the cries of a seagull gave him away. He was dragged to a cross and cruelly murdered. Afterwards, many of the clan — now dispossessed and deprived of all but dignity—fled their island homes.

Some settled in Galloway under the names MacGuffie and MacHaffie while others took refuge in Lochaber, joining the Camerons.

They were fighting alongside the Camerons at Culloden—the day they fell.

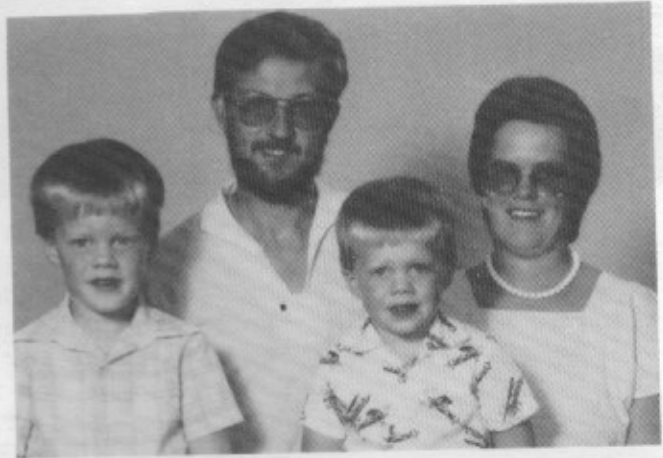
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Items from the Minutes of the Sixth Biennial General Meeting in Adelaide earlier this year have been ratified by our membership as a whole.
