

Clan Macfie

State Parliamentarian Mr Sandy McPhie now commands the reactivated Clan Macfie after being appointed at a ceremony held at the Downs Club

on Wednesday night.

In the late 1960s Dr Earle Douglas MacPhee, of Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, took steps to reactivate Clan Macfie, given that no hereditary line could be traced from Malcolm, the last Chief.

Sandy McPhie formed The Macfie Clan Society of Australia in 1974 in response to a request from Dr MacPhee

The initial membership of the clan society has grown from 23 to more than 350 today.

Clan Macfie was formally recognised as being an active clan on May 27, 1981.

Dr MacPhee was appointed as the clan's first Ceann Cath or Commander on November 6, 1981.

The Ceann Cath has authority to act in all matters for the clan as he would in the personal absence of a hereditary Chief.

Dr MacPhee died in September 1982, and following several endeavours to provide follow-on leadership, the Armigers of Clan Macfie (17 in number) nominated Sandy McPhie from among their ranks for his present appointment as the second Ceann Cath of the Clan.

Clan Mache is one of the oldest of Scottish clans, its history going back before written records were kept.

Sandy McPhie's ancestors migrated to Australia from the Ross of Mull in 1837.

They came on a bounty ship of the Reverend John Dunmore Lang and settled first outside Maitland, north of Sydney.

Mr McPhie's grandfather Alex, came to Too-woomba, from Tamworth, just over 100 years ago, to establish the well-known stock and station agency firm of McPhie and Co.

In Frank Adam's The Clans, Septs and Regiments of the Scottish Highlands the appointment of a Ceann-Cath is discussed as follows:

The "Commander" of the Clan, Ceann-Cath, was the "war-leader" or commander-inchief under the Ceann-Cinnidh (Chief) ... the appointment will normally be by the Chief...but it may(in the chief's absence or incapacity at a crisis) be by selection...from the evidence regarding the Jacobites after "the '45" we find that the accepted term was "Commander of the Clan".

The ceremony for the installation of a ceann-cath is far more straightforward than that for a chief. The ceann-cath's commission is normally read with him standing forth with, say, one foot on a supported targe, after sound of trumpet.

In the Commission granted to our new Commander, Sandy McPhie, he is "appointed both at home and overseas with power and commission to him to do and perform all acts and functions proper to the Commander of the said Clan in the personal absence of the Hereditary Chief thereof, in the same manner and to the same effect as if had been specially appointed and instructed by such Hereditary Chief."



## MEMBERSHIP FEES INCREASED

The Clan Society Executive has reluctantly decided that membership fees must be increased this year.

The new fees are \$6.00 per member or \$12.00 per family resident at the one address. Members under eighteen years of age are still excused from the payment of fees and those over the age of 75 years may continue to apply for an exemption from payment should they so wish.

Our fees were last raised by one dollar to \$5.00 per member in 1983, so the present increase is extremely moderate given the inflation rate since then.

As on previous occasions, those members who have already paid their 1990 (and in some cases, 1991) subscriptions will be invited to make up the difference in subscription rates.

The Executive decided to take no action at this time on a proposal to introduce a Joining Fee, but is actively considering the introduction of a fully paid membership fee.

## REPRINTS OF DR. EARLE MacPHEE'S CLAN MACFIE HISTORY

Reprinting of Dr. Earle Douglas MacPhee's History of the MacDhubhsith -MacDuffie Clan has been arranged in Canada.

Originally issued in five small volumes, Dr. MacPhee rewrote and consolidated Vols. I and II issuing them as a new Vol. VI. He then edited and consolidated the information in the original Vol. III and issued it as a new Vol. VII.

A Volume VIII was added dealing with some pioneers of the Clan in Prince Edward Island, Canada, between 1767 and 1881.

Another Volume of Clan Macfie History in Alberta, Canada, has been written by Barbara Redd MacPhee and Betty Brereton McPhee dealing mainly with twenty six pioneer families there.

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## ULF HAGMAN BECOMES PRESIDENT

Ulf Macfie Hagman (H2-78) of Uddevalla, Sweden, has been elected President of our kindred Clan Society, the Thorburn-Macfie Family Union in Sweden. Congratulations Ulf!

Ulf is a Clan Macfie Armiger and served as Secretary of his Clan Society for many years. He was the initiator of the programme to restore the Mhic-a-Phi Standing Stone on Colonsay, undertaking much of the early work on his own. He was granted Honorary Membership of our Clan Society on 16th April, 1978.

The Thorburn-Macfie Family Union was founded in 1938 and is composed almost entirely of descendants of William Thorburn and Jessy Macfie who migrated to Sweden in the early nineteenth century. William was born at Leith on 12th September 1781 and Jessy at Greenock on 1st September 1790. They were married on 3rd August 1813 at Langhouse near Greenock and moved to Sweden on 10th July 1823. William was in the family tea wholesaling business. They had five children in Sweden.

The Clan Society meets at three yearly intervals on the first Saturday in July. The last meeting was in 1989 when one hundred and five members were present.

## HISTORICAL AND GENEALOGICAL NOTES

HELEN BOUCH (V89-688 of 4 Findon Court, Highett, Vic. 3190 writes...

"My Mother's maiden name was McGuffie. Her parents, William and Mary, came out from Glasgow in 1911 on the R.M.S "Orvieto". Both my brother and I are keen Scottish Country Dancers and my sister-in-law a teacher. I played the bagpipes for a number of years with a ladies pipe band, and my brother is Drum Sargeant of the Moorabbin City Pipe Band. Looking forward to meeting with Clan members in the future."

ALAN CATHIE (V89-684) of 27 Peat Street, Brooklyn, N.S.W. 2253 who is..

"the senior male member of my branch of the Australian Cathies, and have records and personal effects of my male heritage covering seven generations to James Cathie of London born 1816 and died 1875, his father was also James Cathie of London. All details and sub branches are available on computor printouts, and could be made available if desired.

"I am particularly keen to know more of the London Cathies, and in particular when and why the corruption of "Macfie" to "Cathie" occurred. I have briefly spoken to Sandy McPhee's wife of Mt. Vincent and Mrs. Clyde Smythe of Turrumurra, and intend to compose notes further at a mutually convenient time."

JOYCE CALDWELL (Q89-692) of 3 Cam Lane, Annerley, Q. 4103 writes..

"My grandfather, Robert Macfie, was born in Queensland in 1865 and my mother, Mary Ethel Macfie before her marriage, was his eldest daughter. Unfortunately there were no sons in the family and the other three daughters were spinsters.

"My brother is the only other person I know who is likely to be eligible to join the Society. We share our residence and I will pass the information you send me to him also."

GWEN JARVIS (V83-527) of 60 Jones Road, Dandenong, Vic. 3175 writes...

"During the last year or so I have been revising the list I had of my father's family (Charles Carey McPhee). I recently found from a birth certificate of my grandfather, Robert McPhee, that he was born at Lamplough near Avoca in Victoria, also that his parents were both born at Paisley, Scotland.

I am enclosing information from a Certificate of Robert's sisters and brothers, also, his childrens names and births. These are now deceased, but may help others who are descendants of Alexander and Agnes I believe that three brothers originally came from Scotland. There is a record of a John McPhee at Lamplough, Vic. Also, that the last Cobb & Co. coach on the gold run from Maryborough, Vic., went as far as McPhee's.

Robert's sister Janet's grandaughter lives in Dandenong, so I have been able to check their names. Colin McPhee, Box Hill, Vic., was a first cousin of mine, so I guess you have his family's names.

"As it is hard to concentrate on too many names, I have sent the names of Alexander and Agnes McPhee's children and their's to the best of my knowledge.

"As I understand it, our McPhees came to Australia because of the lack of prospects in their home country. Also it has been interesting to read of the method the Scots have of naming their children after the grandparents first, then down to others - an art my generation lost."

ROBERT McPHEE - Born Lamplough, Vic. 7.10.1860 married MARY ANN KING \* Born Dunolly, Vic. 18.9.1861.

Robert McPhee and Mary Ann King were married on 20.9.1882 at Timor, Vic. (near Bowenvale, Maryborough). These areas are all between Avoca and Maryborough, in the Pyrenees Area, highlands in Central Victoria. This was the scene of one of the big gold strikes in Victoria, and an area to which emmigrants from Scotland and Wales came. There was a strong Wesleyan influence from Wales and Cornwall, with singing and Church worship, part of the tradition they brought with them. The McPhee's (Robert's family) were Bakers and he followed this trade, moving around the Goldfields as the gold petered out, lastly to Pitfields, south of Ballarat. Then his family moved to Terang in the western district of Victoria before moving to South Melbourne, Blackburn and Dandenong.

## MORE FROM INVERNESS

In Newsbulletin No 54 (July 1989) we carried several reports from last year's International Gathering of the Clans and Clan Macfie Parliament in Inverness. They included an account by Keith Charles (V89-711) of Mildura of "The Grand Highland Ball" at the conclusion of the International Gathering.

We now reproduce two more of Keith's contributions to the literary record of a most enjoyable visit to Scotland.

ANDY AND THE HAGGIS

## EARLY PLAID BROOCHES



The plaid brooch with a cairngorm centre as worn by the military and in male Highland dress is a comparatively late derivation from the Celtic jewellery of many centuries before. Traditionally the plaid brooch was a woman's ornament worn with the arisaid, the female version of the belted plaid. The arisaid was generally made of a white tartan, it was belted round the waist and fastened at the breast with a large circular brooch of brass or silver. Men fastened their plaids with a strong pin.

The lower brooch in the illustration is typical of an early pattern being heavily engraved with Celtic motifs, strange animals, birds and foliage. Above it is an example of niello work — silver inlaid with a blue-black composition fused into lines in the decoration. The first is the purer form of design, the niello brooch belonging to a period between 1710 and 1780 and showing signs of Lowland influence. Many of these brooches bear initials showing them to be love tokens, others were clearly intended as charms against witchcraft or as an aid in childbirth.

### HIGHLAND DANCING

## BEHIND THE MACE

by Drum Major Norman Vaughan

## GROWTH AND FORMATION OF BANDS:

The first bands were groups of drummers, 4-6 in number, under the direction of a MASTER DRUMMER. These bands were responsible for supplying the beat on the march and for leading troops into battle, and when carrying out this function were always near the colours. This military role appears to have started about the time of the crusades and drummers were recorded as being used at the Battle of Halidon Hill in 1333.

By 1547, the bands had grown in size and the ranks SERGEANT TRUMPETER and MASTER DRUMMER were in usage in the Army.

Pipe Bands originated with pipers only. Bach Clan Chief had his own piper with him. The other officers were also drawn from the clan "heirarchy" and many of these also had their own personal pipers and naturally they followed their master into the Army. These pipers banded together under the leadership of the Clan Chief's piper who became known as the "Piper Major", later called simply the "Pipe Major". These bands were small in number and were originally without drummers.

Pipes and Drums first joined together around the time of the Anglo-Scottish Wars (NV: This is a matter for great conjecture although most authorities agree that they were certainly banded together some time shortly after the '45 Jacobite Uprising), and were established in the British Army by the time of the American War of Independence. The Drum Major had various positions during these early formative years, until finally he slotted into his now traditional spot — front and centre of the band.

By the turn of the century, Pipe Band formations had settled down to their present day shape and, from 1904 onwards, nearly all drum majors carried long maces, some five feet long. The short cane had been, by this time, almost totally discarded, except by the Gurkha Regiments and by British Army bands in war-time service.

Highland Dancing is essentially solo dancing, no partners being involved. The real Highland Dances, of which there are only three — the Highland Fling, the Sword Dance and the Seann Triubhais — were most definitely NOT a lassie's game in their original form. Of the three, the Fling is the oldest, considered to be based on the rutting movements of the stag in season, a kind of fertility dance.

Malcom Canore, King of Scots, is credited with the Sword Dance. The story goes that in 1058 he slew an opponent in a pitched battle. He had only recently been converted to Christianity and, with this in mind and overjoyed at his victory, he placed his own sword and that of his enemy on the ground in the form of a cross, and danced in triumph over them.

The Scann Triubhais pronounced "shan trews" is the youngest of the Highland Dances. It was devised as a dance of derision during the period after Culloden, when the wearing of the kilt was proscribed, often under penalty of death. The name Seann Triubhais means ugly or unwanted trousers, and the movements of the dance, the shake, shake down of the leg, are a visible attempt to discard the hated garment. The dance is the most graceful of the trio because of its tempo and movements, and many men dance it in tartan trews for greater effect.

## COUNTRY DANCING

Country Dancing is by its nature a group dance form, consisting mainly of strathspreys and reels, in which sets of two, three and four couples — or even more, perform the steps together. The movements are few and simple to learn, the beauty and enjoyment being in the design woven by the dance, and its leisurely tempo. It has nothing to do with the country or rural scene, being a corruption of the French contredanse — dancing opposite one another.

## 'Extinct' fish found by electronic haggis

Scientists hope to mon-
