SANDY AND HELEN GUESTS OF SYDNEY SCOTTISH WEEK 1995

Clan Commander and Clan Society President, Sandy McPhie, of Cambooya, Q'ld., and his wife, Helen, have accepted the invitation of The Scottish Australian Heritage Council to be Official Guests at this year's Sydney Scottish Week.

In the past, the Heritage Council has invited two Clan Chiefs from Scotland, or a Clan Chief plus a prominent citizen from Scotland, as guests for the week. This is the first occasion on which an Australian Clan Chief or Clan Commander has been invited and is thus a most significant honour for Sandy and Helen, and Clan Macfie. The second guest for the week is John Baillie-Hamilton, 13th Earl of Haddington, from Gordon, Berwickshire.

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT



I am recently back from an excellent trip to Atlanta, Georgia, for the Eleventh International Gathering of Clan Macfie and the Stone Mountain Highland Games. Clan members worldwide generously contributed to a special fund to cover my travel expenses for the Gathering and I am most grateful for this. Thank you.

Helen and I are now looking towards Sydney's Scottish Week at the end of this month at which we will be official Details regarding our visit and the Scottish Week programme are on the front page and page 3. We are looking forward to a good Clan representation during the week, especially at the Clans' March on Sunday, 26th, and at the Clan barbeque at the home of N.S.W. Vice-President Geoff McPhee and wife ruth in Lugarno on the 25th.

After that - and Christmas and New Year - we will be able to turn our attention to the Clan Society's Eleventh Biennial General Meeting in Brisbane on 25th and 26th May next year.

I am sure you will agree that any "History" of Clan Members in Australia last century must be as comprehensive as possible, and with that in mind, we intend to continue to work on the History whenever possible, but with an open ended completion date for the present.

This year has disappeared at an incredible rate, probably because we have been so busy - is this a problem with retirement?

Helen joins with me in thanking you all for your letters, support, encouragement and contributions during the year. We wish you and your families the very best for Christmas and the New Year, and look forward to hearing from you in 96.

THE PRICE OF A TRAM FARE IN ABERDEEN!

Back in the depression of the 1930s the Aberdeen City Council in an effort to increase patronage, and thereby revenue, decided after much heart-burning to lower the price of the average fare from 3d down to 2d. The result was not an increase in revenue as anticipated. Instead, there was a great clamour of concern and disgust from all sectors of the community. So Council called in a firm of consultants to find the reason for a further drop in tram revenues. After some six weeks the consultants reported "Previous to the decrease in fares, a great many of the workers and other commuters preferred to walk to work thereby saving themselves 6d a day! Now, these folk were very angry that their savings had dropped to only 4d a day!"

of the ancient vegetarians

THE remains of Britain's earliest recorded vegetarian community have been discovered at an ancient settlement on a small island off the west coast of Scotland.

They give early man some-thing of a Squirrel Nutkin image because it appears that hazelnuts made up a formidable share of his diet.

Archaeologists on Colon-say, in the Hebrides, are excited by the finds including a shallow pit containing the remains of thousands of burned out hazelnut shells from the Mesolithic period dating back 8,000 years. The pit lay beside another

circular hollow close to the shore which is believed to be the traces of one of the earliest examples of a house ever found in Scotland.

No traces of animal bones or shells from the abundant fish around the island have been uncovered - giving rise to the conclusion that these early islanders lived on what they gleaned from the local vegetation.

The precise function of the nut-pit is not clear, but archaeologists believe it may have been the place where the nuts were roasted and shelled, or where they were stored for later use.

Although similar hoards of hazelnut shells have been found at other sites, including Farnham in Surrey, the sheer size of the Colonsay find has startled the research

Thejournal of the Council for British Archaeology, says of the find: "The scale of the activity, unparalleled elsewhere in Scotland, suggests the possibility that Colonsay contained a community of enforced vegetarians.'



Roast nut diet | In a nutshell, here are the origins of the veggie species

EVIDENCE of Britain's earliest vegetarian community is said to have been dis-covered on the island of Colonsay, off the west coast of Scotland. The Telegraph reported last Friday that archaeologists had found a shal-

low pit containing the remains of thousands of burned-out hazelnut shells from the Mesolithic period, about 8,000 years ago.

There were no signs of animal bones or fish shells, so the experts believe the pit was used for roasting or storing the nuts by these vegetarian ancestors of

This is fascinating stuff. I am just wondering if these people could actually be the earliest recorded animal rights activists. Or even the first anti-hunting campaigners. Perhaps they invaded the crude dwellings of a nearby commu-nity of Mesolithic meateaters, berated them, stamped on their stone arrowheads, and stopped their boats leaving for the mainland with the carcasses of the beasts they had hunted down.

I think we can deduce that these vegetarians were probably the first examples of middle-class and otherwise respectable protestors engaging in vio-lent direct action. The evidence for this is that they kept their old burned nutshells in a pit. They did not wander round dropping shells on the ground all over Colonsay. They may have been Mesolithic, but they were not slobs.

Indeed, we might say that these people were the earliest known environmentalists. They had effectively invented the litter bin - a pit into which they encouraged one another to drop their burned-out nutshells. They probably scratched combinations of basic symbols on rocks in the area which meant

"Keep Colonsay Tidy"

The important question we must now ask ourselves What clothes did these early, middle-class, environmentalist vegetarians wear as protection against the harsh Colonsay winter? They were obviously strict in their vegetarianism, as they did not allow even a limpet or a cockle to pass their lips, so surely they would not clothe themselves in animal skins.

If they did, the members of the nearby meat-eating community would surely come over, point sticks at them and emit a series of grunts which, being loosely translated, meant: "Oh, so if you think you're so pure and wonderful not eating deer and wild goat and things like that, then how do you justify wearing ani-mal skins?" In that case you could say that the

> members of the carnivore community of Colonsay were the earliest inventors of the clever debating point.

My theory is

that the vegetari-ans would avoid falling into this trap and that they wove reeds and grasses together to make clothes for themselves. Then they learned to weave rush matting and even rather attractive wall coverings for their simple habitations. It is my belief that these middleclass Mesolithic vegetarians were, in fact, the inventors of the earliest craft centre.

Even wearing these early grass polo-neck sweaters and peasant-style skirts, they would still feel the Colonsay cold. It could have been then that they decided to set fire to the nutshells in their primitive litter bins to provide a bit of warmth.

At this point, I guess, one of the elders of the community must have suddenly clutched his fore-





head and said, in fluent Mesolithic: "Great Heavens! Do you realise what we are doing here? By burning these nutshells we are endangering the planet and creating a greenhouse effect, whatever a greenhouse is. This is not at all environmentally friendly.'

So they packed up their simple belongings, left the smouldering shells behind, crossed to the mainland and headed south in search of a milder climate. Eventually they ended up in an area which is now north London, on a site which we now call Islington.

I am now working on another, entirely different theory. There could be a much simpler explanation for those roasted hazelnuts in the pit on Colonsay. Could this be the first recorded evidence of the manufacture of the confectionary bar?

Perhaps the archaeolo-gists have discovered leftovers on the spot where our early ancestors, almost by accident, learned to combine crunchy roasted hazelnut with delicious creamy caramel and then coat the mixture in smooth, rich chocolate.

McPHEE THE OVERLANDER. Professor Jack Cross of the University of South Australia has been researching the history of the Northern Territory 1860-1890, for some years, and is seeking assistance with details of some early McPhees in the area.... "I am at present researching the first name of the McPhee who accompanied Price Wynnal Cox (brother of the earlier overlander Dillon Cox) on an epic overland trip from Queensland towards Port Darwin in 1874-5 with a mob of pedigree horses, to be bred at Cox's Peninsula opposite Palmerston, for the Indies remount trade.

The expedition was abandoned at the Limmen Bight River when they lost their way, ran out of food and were attacked by Aborigines who took away their equipment. McPhee, who seems to have been second in command, escaped with some spear wounds. Cox, his family and some drovers like Goulder, were then

all drowned on the Barrier Reef in coming south on the Gothenburg.

Two possible candidates are: 1) Duncan McPhee who became a station manager in the upper territory. Last reference to him in the 1891 census, age 55, living in Palmerston, and: 2) R. C. S. McPhee, who in two trips in 1880 and 1881 overlanded stock from Townsville. I am not sure if these relate to the "Jock" McPhee of Elsey Station, or the McPhees of the Kimberley region." JOHN MACFIE FROM SKYE. Mrs. Margaret Peters of 7 Richard Street, Lota, Q. 4179, would be interested in any details relating to her grandfather, John Macfie, who migrated from Skye - ship and year unknown - but he met his future wife on the voyage out. Their son, Alexander, was born at Jimbour, Q., in December 1879 and their daughter, Sarah Jane, known as Jeannie or Jean, (Margaret's mother) at Irvingdale, Q., in October 1882. The family later moved to Eidsvold, Q., where John was a storekeeper and his wife a dressmaker.

· Hogmanay:

A quaint feature of Hogmanay — and the reason for much liquid consumption and conviviality — is the custom of "first footing".

This refers to the first foot to cross the threshold of a house after midnight in the new year, which is believed to bring good luck to that house and all who live in it for the coming year.

That person must be a man, who must be tall and darkhaired, and he must carry a piece of coal or peat and a full bottle. (The instructions don't specify what the bottle should be filled with, but we'll take a guess at it being alcohol.)

All of the above are tokens of warmth and prosperity in the new year.

Advice to those attending a Hogmanay: unless you are a tall, dark, male and have a spare piece of coal and a full bottle with you, get there early or well after midnight, as the Scots take their Hogmanay and first footing very seriously and don't like it messed about by Sassenachs.

If you are chosen to be the "first foot", you are expelled from the house for a few minutes before midnight, equipped with the said tokens, and must wait until the clock strikes 12 to enter and become the heart and soul of the party.

A recipe for ...

We've presented this "recipe" before, but in the spirit of the season thought it may be worth publishing again.

The Thistle of Scotland

Por centuries Norse invaders had raided the coasts of Scotland. Despite heroic defence by the Scottish peoples, these raids became ever fiercer and the Vikings began to settle in conquered lands. Norse Kings then laid claim to large tracts of Scotland, notably the Western Isles. In 1263, with the balance of power delicately balanced, the Scottish army under Alexander III was aligned against the might of the Vikings.

At night, the Scots lay resting,



renewing their energies for the decisive battle that would come with the dawn. The Vikings sought to surprise the Scots by creeping up stealthily – and barefoot – and overwhelming them as they slept. Their ruse might have succeeded, had not a leading Viking trod upon the spiky thistle and cried out in agony, thereby alerting the Scots.

The defenders fell upon the Norsemen, who fled in their longships in disarray and sailed off north to their Scandinavian homelands. The threat to Scotland was ended! The thistle thus became the emblem of Scotland, bearing the motto "Nemo me impune lacessir" literally "No-one hurts me with impunity" or more colloquially "Wha daur meddle wi' me?"

HISTORICAL AND GENEALOGICAL NOTES

Bill McGuffie (Q77-272) of Holloways Beach, near Cairns, Q., is one of our senior members. In reply to a recent request for family history Bill's family wrote:

"Bill's great grandfather, Daniel McGuffie, was born at Galloway, Scotland, in 1816 and died on 8 Oct 1896. (He could read and write, quite an achievment in those days). He married a Helen Wallace McCloud and when they arrived on the 'Ocean Chief' from Liverpool on 28 Jan 1856 at Hobart their children were Margaret [9], Alexander [7], Helen [3], James [2] and Jane [6 months]. A third son, Daniel, was born in Providence Valley, Hobart, their only child born in Tasmania.

This second Daniel married Maria Dowding on 1 Jan 1882. Their marriage certificate was signed by a Maria McGuffie and Thomas McGuffie, it's not known if they were husband and wife or whether they were Daniel's brother and sister.

A William McGuffie, aged 33, arrived in Hobart on 23 Sep 1854 on the `Emma Prescott' from Melbourne, it is thought he was a brother of the first Daniel. The only information on him is that he joined the police force.

In the Hobart museum there is a statue of an aborigine, a tree and a dog. It was given to Daniel McGuffie by Martin Cash (a notorious bushranger) for saving his life. 'Daniel McGuffie saved Martin Cash from being crushed against a wall by his own horse'. The Vase (statue) was presented to the museum by Daniel McGuffie in 1964.

Bill's uncles were Bill, Athol, Harold, Roy and Eric McGuffie (all deceased), Bill's brothers were Eric and Roy (deceased), Bill's son - William, nephews - Ronald and Keith McGuffie and grandsons - Daniel, Liam and Cameron McGuffie. all live in North Queensland.

We would be interested to hear from anyone with any information re the early McGuffies as we know little of them."

Who owned McPhee's Barn at Newstead, Vic? The May 1995 copy of The Scots Link carried an item on Newstead, a small gold mining community near Menzies Crossing on the Loddon River in Victoria. The first church service there was held under a red gum in the mid 1850's by a Congregational layman from Castlemaine. The first Presbyterian service was held in McPhee's barn in March 1859, conducted in Gaelic by Rev. McDonald of Kyneton.

The following year locally made bricks were used to build a church and the Rev. John Sutherland came from Scotland as the first resident minister. However, the introduction of a small harmonium instead of the traditional precentor to lead the singing caused quite a split in the church and the Highlanders amongst the congregation returned to McPhee's barn where all was in Gaelic and there was no newfangled machinery! Which McPhee family owned this Barn?

Cloncurry Gold Miners. Mrs. Vicki Brown of Gympie, Q., forwarded details of the inscription on a lonely Macfie grave near Cloncurry in north west Queensland: "The Cloncurry area had lots of small townships, now all vanished - that is except for their cemeteries. The majority of people who lived in these mining places, or railway places (of even shorter existence) were mostly poor and when I saw some memorials on graves it made me wonder how many others were buried without grave stones. At Mount Cuthbert - an old mining town - was the inscription (below) on a memorial stone with a tall column."


McFIE, NEIL

Wayne Tapp of Cloncurry was able to add that Neil was 57 at the time of his death and was a blacksmith.



SHIPPING LIST DATA - Sometimes apparent incorrect ages, etc., on shipping lists can confuse the novice researcher. What you must remember is that there were a number of regulations and condions that governed assisted passages to Australia. The conditions varied, depending on the time period and the particular scheme under which the migrant travelled. Certain occupations such as blacksmith were banned at times - they could set themselves up in business at a time when farm workers were required. It was common practice for parents to either increase or lower their age or those of their children to satisfy the group age requirements. So if your ancestor was listed as "Agl" (Agricultural labourer), it could be a misnomer! Use ages as a guide only and verify from other sources. (Thanks to Clan MacLean Assn. Newsletter, June '95).
