FROM YOUR PRESIDENT



Consolidated financial statements for the two year period (1994-95) are a separate insert in the Newsbulletins going to Clan Society members.

In accordance with paragraph 15 of our Constitution, the decisions taken at the General Meeting are now subject to ratification by the membership as a whole. This includes a number of routine amendments to our constitution which were submitted and carried in accordance with paragraph 27 of the Constitution, and had been detailed to members along with supporting reasoning for the amendments, in our last Newsbulletin (No. 74, March 1996).

The BGM weekend was run at a financial loss of \$11.70 to the Society - this was attributed to the hire of a TV and VCR (\$90) to show videos at the luncheon of the Colonsay land for sale and our last Gathering on Colonsay in 1993, and which cost was not apportioned when costing the luncheon to members.

HISTORICAL AND GENEALOGICAL NOTES

Jayne Webster (N95-879) of 13 Lansbury Close, Adamstown Heights, N.S.W. 2289, writes:

"I engaged the services of a Scottish researcher in the hope of getting my McPhee family back another generation - sadly without any luck - I've since turned to the drink in desperation and despair after drowning from having no more straws to grab!

Anyway..... my researchers name is Hazel Weir who lives in Edinburgh. Hazel was following up on the family story that our line of McPhees were travelling people, she kindly contacted an archivist at the 'School of Scottish Studies' in Scotland. The school holds oral material on travelling people, the archivist confirmed McPhees were traditional travelling people and she kindly printed out the McPhee information for me.

My McPhee family came from the little fishing village of Glenelg, on the mainland just across the bay from the Isle of Skye. In her search to try to get my family back another generation Mrs. Weir copied out numberous entries from parish records of McPhees that possible could be related to my lot."

Jayne holds the copy of the old records referred to above. Perhaps they are the original Macfie tinkers, and, no, we don't really believe she took to the drink!

Alison Flavel (S96-909) of 12 Sherwood Terrace, Glen Osmond, S.A. 5064, has recently joined the Clan Society. Alison is from a New Zealand McFie line but has lived in Adelaide for over 40 years. Her great grandfather, Donald McFie, was born at Shiskine, Isle of Arran, in 1835 and died at Arthurstown, N.Z., on 14th August 1913. He had three sisters that Alison knows of, Elizabeth (b. 1834), Janet (b. 1838) and Margaret (b. 1840). She believes they left the Arran in 1840 and says:-

"Donald was a mariner and when in New Zealand waters at the time of the gold rushes, he jumped ship... in Otago, thence to Hokitika, West Coast, South Island, N.Z. He was engaged to Flora McLean (born Isle of Coll 1835) when he left Scotland and sent money for her to go out to New Zealand to be married. They married in Hokitika on the 12th March 1866, both about 30 or 31 years of age — but I think that they altered their ages a little. When Donald jumped ship he changed his name to Daniel McPhee so as not to be detected.

Their children, Archie, born 1867 - I do not know anything about Archie, but think he was a policeman and think that he died of food poisoning between 1913 and 1922. I do not know whether he married. Janet, born 1868, married Captain Coll McDonald (a ship's captain) and lived in Dunedin. Elizabeth, born 1869, married Fred Lillecrapp and lived in Adelaide, S.A. Mary, born 1871, married Jack McIntosh who owned and lived at the Red Lion Hotel, Hokitika, and Flora (my grandmother) born 1877, died 1960 aged 82, married James Alexander Howat and lived at Arthurstown, just out of Hokitika, South Island, New Zealand.

The parents of Donald McFie were James McFie and Margaret (nee Robertson) who married in June 1833 at Torbeg on the Isle of Arran. James was also a mariner. I think that Margaret may have also been known as Jessie. The children of Donald and Flora were very good looking and this seems to have been passed on down through the generations, so I am curious as to where the handsome looks came from.... the McFies or the McLeans. (Ed. - it was the McFies of course!)

When in Scotland in 1983 we motored all around the west coast of Scotland and motored around the Isle of Skye. At that stage of my life I wasn't all that interested in family history and yet I knew that my forebears came from the Isle of Arran and Isle of Coll - it is only in the last few years that I have delved. Knowing that the Society has access to many branches of the McFie clan, I would be interested if any of what I have mentioned above ties in with any part of a family tree that you may have."

- * Entry in 1995 GRD McHAFFIE. In March K. J. Mahaffey of 1 Gardiner Road, Formby, Merseyside, L37 8DD, England, wrote:- "I am a member of Manchester and Lancashire Family History Society and saw your entry in the GRD. My father was registered at birth (in Glasgow Scotland) in 1876 as Matthew McHAFFIE, his parents being Matthew McHAFFIE and Janet (Templeton?) McALLISTER who were married in Raloo Co. Antrim, Ireland on 25 November 1864. My wife and I paid a visit to Northern Ireland last year visiting the Church where my father was married in Carrickfergus (to his first wife) and the Church where my grandparents were married in 1864. It is believed the family returned from Glasgow to Carrickfergus, my father leaving there after marriage to Elizabeth ALEXANDER in 1899 and moving to Newcastle upon Tyne, having changed his name to the spelling I use today. There is some further information available for any interested members"

COLONSAY REMEMBERED

These special memories of Colonsay come from Margaret Brooks of Sydney, Australia, who spent many of her childhood holidays on Colonsay before the war.

We all have happy memories of childhood summer holidays, of carefree times long ago when the sun seemed brighter and the skies bluer. Such thoughts take me back to wonderful days on the island of Colonsay where one of my grandparents came from.

At the start of the holiday, as the steamer dropped anchor off Scalasaig, I was always nervous about getting down into the open boat which came out to ferry us ashore - a mixed cargo of people, luggage and animals. Once on dry land all that was forgotten as relatives greeted us and the holiday had begun.

I clearly remember my seventh birthday there on a lovely August day in the late 1920s. That summer, an English cousin from Kent came with us and brought me a present of a huge jigsaw puzzle. This was put out on the table for wet days but I don't remember ever staying indoors long enough to do it. We were free to wander where we liked. There were no cars and we walked and scrambled everywhere around Scalasaig and beyond and sometimes we would trek as far as Kiloran Bay, the Colonsay children leading these expeditions which took all day. When sent to a farm to collect eggs and cream we never hurried and no matter how long we took getting back the eggs were never broken and the cream was never spilt.

We spent a good deal of time on the beaches but we didn't swim as the water was too cold. A succession of summer visits took us through our growing up years during which I learned to speak some Gaelic and deep friendships were formed. Then came the stormclouds of war and in August 1939 Colonsay was left behind for the war which changed all our lives so much. It was more than twelve years before I returned, this time with my husband and three young children. We stayed at the hotel and I enjoyed showing my family the island and introducing them to the folks there. There were a few cars now and so we were driven to Kiloran Bay to spend a day there. Our seven year old daughter loved everything that I had done at her age. She was spoiled by everyone and copied their soft lilting Highland accents. She "helped" with milking and feeding the calves and announced that when she grew up she was going to live on Colonsay "for ever and ever".

Not quite - but she has since returned with her husband and they enjoy regular holidays in the cottages, the island now offering a wide variety of facilities for visitors.

Recently, on a trip "home" from Australia, I returned to Colonsay after a gap of many years. As we sailed from Oban on the MacBraynes car ferry I was eager to see the changes which had been made. Berthing alongside the pier and driving off was so different from my early experiences. I remembered the verse we knew as children:

"The Earth is the Lords, and all that it contains

Excepting just the boats and the piers

And they belong to MacBraynes."

Colonsay in the nineties was busy with cheerful holiday makers. Gone were the days when we knew nearly everyone and were related to many. I went all over the island visiting old haunts and one day spent a quiet hour on the sands of Kiloran Bay. With a lifetime of memories in my mind I could hear the voices of people long gone. It was a very special time.

You can leave Colonsay, as so many have done over the years, but Colonsay never leaves you, and I hope one day to return.

He noted that no request for assistance had been made this year.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR 1994-1995 TERM OF OFFICE

The President read his Biennial Report. A copy is attached at Annex A to these

Minutes. Moved Nevell McPhee Seconded Lorraine McPhee That the President's Report be received.

The President then commented briefly as follows on matters arising in 1996:

- (i) Merchandise. Through generous assistance by two members of the Executive, a fund has been established to purchase merchandise for resale to members and an order placed for distinctive lapel pins etc.;
- (ii) <u>Colonsay Land</u>. Although the appeal to Clan Members worldwide for donations to buy land on Colonsay had only recently been made, the initial response had been encouraging. The Chairman indicated the proposed amendments to the Clan Society Constitution were brought forward by the Executive following a review of the Constitution and the Executive's Standing Orders which interpret the application of the constitution in certain instances.

 Reason: To include the Trustees already provided for in para 25 of the
 constitution, in the list of Office Bearers.
 - ii) Paragraph 10 (i) Amend sub-paragraph (6) to read:

"(6) Clan Chief, Chieftains or equivalent appointments resident in in Australia, and" (ii) Amend Note i to read:

"When there is no Clan Chief, Chieftain or equivalent appointment resident in Australia, the Society Executive may appoint a Seneschal to act as Clan Leader in Australia"

The remainder of the note remains unchanged.

(iii) Amend Note ii in the second last line by inserting "Chief" before "Chieftain" and "or equivalent appointment" after "Chieftain".

Reason: To provide for other appointments in addition to a Chieftain. CARRIED

(iii) Paragraph 11 (i) Renumber existing Para 11 to 11 (1)

(ii) Insert a new para 11 (2) to read:

(2) When a meeting of the Society Executive is held, a record of discussions is to be forwarded within 14 days to all members of the Executive for ratification. A morning of the Executive

Executive for ratification. A quorum at a meeting of the Executive is to consist of not less than four members". Reason: To formalise the distribution of Executive Meeting minutes and provide for a quorum at such meetings.

(v) Paragraph 22 In line one before "Chieftains" insert "Chief" and after "Chieftains" insert "or equivalent appointments" Reason: To provide for other appointments in addition to a Chieftain. CARRIED

(vi) After Paragraph 23 (i) Insert a new paragraph 24 to read:
"24. A Travel Fund is to be established to assist the Clan Leader to attend sittings of Clan Parliament, and, when resident overseas, to visit Australia on invitation from the Clan Society. The fund is to be administered by the Clan Society Executive and contributed to by approved methods including, if agreed, the allocation in any year of up to 10% of annual subscriptions collected, to establish and operate a Travel Fund to assist the Clan Macfie leader with travel expenses to attend

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Fellow Clan Members,

I have pleasure in presenting my report for the 1994 - 1995 term of office. During this period the Clan Society continued to function effectively and strengthen its overall position.

Membership numbers stand at an all time high of 493 - a net increase of 32 during the two years against the 76 new members who joined the Society during that time. In August 1994 we extended Honorary Membership of the Clan Society to Iain and Fiona McFie in Scotland, in recognition of the ties they have established with our members visiting there. They became the sixth and seventh overseas members of the Clan so recognised. Our Newsbulletins have maintained their broad content of interest for members and are published regularly three times a year. They are exchanged with some 23 other Clans and organisations in Australia as well as with all the overseas societies of our Clan.

Finances remain sound, but a drop in general funds over the period has necessitated an increase in fees from 1996 to offset increasing costs and commitments. Our fees were last increased in 1990. The new rates compare quite favourably with those of other Clan Societies and should remain constant for a number of years. Plans are in hand in 1996 to at long last arrange for the marketing of "Macfie" merchandise items to Clan members in Australia. This should assist also with the Society's finances.

Many donations continued to be received from members for both Clan Society and Clan commitments and I am most appreciative of this generous support. These donations have significantly helped with the Society's operations during the period, have resulted in a sound increase in Trust Funds, and permitted the Clan Society to strongly support all facets of Clan Macfie endeavours. The Executive has established a special fund to assist the President, under certain conditions, with travel expenses to attend Society Biennial General Meetings in different centres in Australia.

Thanks to the initiative and dedication of Queensland Vice-President, Bob McPhee, the annual J. D. Lang Poetry Prize conducted by the Society has prospered and will expand in 1996. The winners of the 1995 competition were announced at an enjoyable function, organised by Bob, in Brisbane on Clan Macfie Day which contributed to the financial viability of the prize and to the Society's income for the year. Bob was also the driving force behind the Queensland Combined Clans Ceilidh in Brisbane last October and it too, brought a useful shared profit to the Clan Society. Thank you Bob.

Our contribution to Clan affairs as one of eight Clan Societies world wide continues at a strong level. In addition to financial support with the prompt payment of per capitas and transfer of members donations in a number of areas, Society members attended the Clan Gathering in Atlanta in October last year, and a number are looking at attending the Clan Gathering and Parliament in Scotland next year. During the period of this report, the Clan Society and its members contributed \$430 in per capitas, \$167 for Standing Stone maintenance, \$90 towards Clan Projects, \$55 to the Clan Capital Fund and \$12 to the Clan Working Fund. In addition, the Clan

Society and members responded most generously with \$519 for the appeal for funds to assist with my travel costs in attending the Clan Gathering in Atlanta in my capacity as Clan Commander. In this context, the Society Executive has established a fund to assist a Clan Chief or Commander with travel costs to attend Clan Parliament or, if a future incumbent is resident overseas, to visit Australia on invitation from the Clan Society.


In addition to our Clan Macfie commitments, and the necessary increase in membership subscription rates, mentioned by the President, the following points are noteworthy:

 D. Lang Poetry Prize are relevant only to amounts passed through that account. A complete balance sheet for the 1995 Poetry Prize and associated dinner was distributed to members in the March Newsbulletin this year (No. 74) and showed an overall profit to the Society of \$534.40.
