# AUSTRALIAN FIRE SERVICE MEDAL AWARD TO JOHN McPHEE (V77-308) OF WHITTLESEA, VIC.

A recent copy of "Fireman", the Volunteer Firefighter's Paper in Victoria reported the award of the Australian Fire Service Medal to John McPhee, a former Captain in the rural fire service, in recognition of his long and outstanding service. A farmer at Whittlesea in Western Victoria, John joined the Whittlesea Fire Brigade as a 17 year old youngster in 1955. His service over four decades at brigade, group and regional level was exceptional, including 19 years as Captain of the brigade where his great leadership skills contributed greatly in the operational and administrative fields. His award was the only one made to a Country Fire Authority member in this year's Queen's Birthday Honours List in Victoria. He remains actively involved to-day, contributing in the communications area. Well done John, well deserved! Congratulations!

# HISTORICAL AND GENEALOGICAL NOTES

- \* Pat Barling, 10 Serpentine Street, Duffy, A.C.T. 2611 is looking for additional information on his ancestor Catherine McPhee who was born on Skye circa 1850 and married John Barling of Breakwater, Vic., at Geelong on 22<sup>nd</sup> September 1873. John died at Geelong 20<sup>th</sup> April 1904. No shipping arrival information or date of death provided for Catherine who was the daughter of Archibald McPhee and Annie McKinnon. John and Catherine had seven children (3 boys, 4 girls) between 1874 and 1890...... Any information direct to Pat please, plus a drop copy to Secretary Helen.
- \* Marlena Turner (T97-925) 9/17 Armitage Cres., Burnie Tas. 7320 had a query placed in our July Newsbulletin (No. 78) regarding her McPhee ancestors. It brought a prompt reply from Gilbert and Beverley McPhee (V80-472 & 476) of Lakes Entrance, Vic.. Marlena's John McPhee is the great grandfather of both Gilbert and Bev. He came from Ayr in 1855 with his first wife Agnes (John's line) and following her death, married a Robina Smith (Bev's line). Gilbert and Bev were able to provide Marlena with full McPhee information and, no doubt, lay the foundation for some long talks when they do meet up.
- \* Marie Smith (N95-883) of Woodbine, N.S.W. was Marie Ann Kay, born Kyogle N.S.W. 12 January 1948. Her family research has gone back over three generations where a William Kay married one Agnes McPhee at Eagleshem, Renfrewshire, Scotland on 1st June 1849. Agnes was born in Strunder, Argyleshire, on 6 May 1823 and died Southgate, N.S.W. on 9 May 1910. Marie has full information on all eight ancestors of that generation and too, is rather proud of the next generation as well her daughter is with Morgan Stanley the global financial group and completing a law degree this year at Sydney Uni......
- \* From Janet Reakes Column in the Brisbane "Sunday Mail" Several people have shown interest in having their family trees computerised into large charts and wonder how this can be done. If people own the software "Family Tree Maker" (PC and Mac) (\$175) this will allow the printing of a variety of charts "as big as a football field". You need to take a disk to a shop that does drafting. Otherwise Malcolm Goddard, P.O. Box 281, Bulimba, Q. 4171, or email <m.goddard@qut.edu.au> can produce charts approximately up to 1100mm x 900mm in size. He does not research and you must supply the names and choose the preferred layout.

## **CLAN HISTORY IN AUSTRALIA**



Our first list of Shipping Arrival information for last century appears below and over the page. The information has been steadily assembled over the years by a team of Clan Society researchers, but is still far from complete. Extracting the data itself is a slow job given the poor quality of some records, the large number of "Macfies" who migrated last century and the large number of entry ports. To further complicate matters, some computer records consulted have used the surname spelling "McPhee" throughout to avoid, they say, confusion through different spellings of the name in the actual shipping records!

The amount of information in the lists following has been reduced to fit across the page to facilitate presentation and consequently some information such as date of departure, place of residence etc., has been omitted. If your oldies appear in the lists and you would like this additional information, contact Secretary Helen.

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OUR FIRST ARRIVAL. Our research to date indicated the "Admiral Barrington", a convict transport of 527 tons, brought the first Clan Macfie member to Australia - convict Daniel McFee who had been sentenced to 7 years at the Wiltshire Assizes on 21<sup>st</sup> April 1789. The "Admiral Barrington" was one of nine convict transports making up the 3<sup>rd</sup> Fleet which left Portsmouth on 27<sup>th</sup> March 1791. They sailed direct to Rio and then east to Australia, not calling at Cape Town. En route the fleet was scattered by storms with the ships arriving independently. The "Admiral Barrington" was the last to arrive on 3<sup>rd</sup> December 1791.

On 22<sup>nd</sup> January 1827 a Sarah Margaret McFie was christened at Scots Church, Sydney, (born 11 January 1827), the daughter of a Daniel McFie and Sarah Moor. The father was a private soldier in the Veterans Company. The same Daniel who arrived in the "Admiral Barrington"? Perhaps, perhaps not. Certainly we haven't located another Daniel McFee/McFie amongst passengers or convicts arriving before 1827, but there could have been one amongst the soldiers or ships' crews in those early days.

Above the Shield, on a Wreath of the Liveries is set for Crest a demi-lion rampant Sable grasping it its forepaws a holly leaf paleways vert and in an Escrol over the same this Motto "SEMPER PRO REGE." Helen thus joins the small band of Armigers of Clan Macfie and becomes our third lady Armiger.

# Do You Have Those Old Dates & Years Correctly?

When genealogists and others research births, deaths and marriages prior to the middle of the 18<sup>th</sup> century they have to tread warily - for reasons, some of which are outlined below.

Gregory XIII (Ugo Buoncompagni) 1502-1585, Italian Pope (1572-1585), was a professor of law from Bologna and he became one of the theologians at the Council of Trent. He displayed extraordinary zeal for the promotion of education and endowed many colleges in Rome. His pontificate, however, is notable for the correction of the calendar and the introduction of the "Gregorian Computations" in the year 1582.

The government of the United Kingdom of England, Scotland, and at that time Ireland, did NOT accept the Gregorian Calendar till one hundred and seventy years later - despite the fact that all other European countries had done so many years previously. There is nothing on record to explain why successive governments of Great Britain procrastinated for nearly two centuries to 1752, or what brought the matter to a head.

Prior to 1752, under the **Julian Calendar**, as introduced by Julius Caesar, the New Year began on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of March, and ended on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of March following.

In the year 1752, in order to bring "The New Style Calendar" into use and at the same time synchronise the time with the rest of Europe, it was necessary to lop eleven days off the month of September, and at the same time start the New Year on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January with the 365<sup>th</sup> day ending on the 31<sup>st</sup> day of December.

This is the reason why you may come across the year which should be 1752, shown as 1751-52, depending on the month and the day. Another example: You may see a number of dates like 28<sup>th</sup> December 1696 and 12<sup>th</sup> January 1696, these two dates are in the same year i.e., 1696, and are only 15 days apart, NOT nearly twelve months!

One may also come across the date 30<sup>th</sup> February recorded for the year 1741 and earlier, this is not an error as prior to 1751-52 February did have 31 days in the Julian Calendar.

# Smart Moves with Family Search

It takes a while to develop a really effective strategy when consulting the IGI at computer. The programme is so powerful that there are "hidden possibilities" to speed up your work, and increase the "hits".

The following was written by Riley Williams of the Aberdeen Family History Centre, Scotland, and issued via his fidonet terminal 2:259/73. The method involves using the Holding File - it is one of the menu options given by the F2 key at the point when you choose to print what you have found. The purpose of this Holding File is to make a store, for copying later, either to paper or to floppy disc for home use. Here is riley's Recipe! -

- Perform a Parents Search specifying the names of both parents, father first. Capture all matching records into the Holding File.
- Perform another Parents File, this time omitting the mother's surname, and capture all matching records into the Holding File.
- Perform a Marriage Search for those parents, capturing all matching records into the Holding File.
- Perform Individual Searches on any names of interest not found so far, capturing any likely entries into the Holding File.

- Perform Marriage Searches for each child that is of interest, capturing any likely entries into the Holding File.
- Repeat the above steps for each marriage found in Step 5 until either (a) you have only another ten minutes on the computer, or (b) you run out of marriages to check.

For a large number of entries found, you may fill the Holding File several times, so ensure that you can pay for all the printouts!, or, bring sufficient floppy disc capacity.

Our practice is normally use the Holding File and print to paper only if less than about ten sheets of printouts are required. A great advantage of copying to disc is that the results can be "massaged" at home, i.e., reformatted and spurious entries deleted.

We at Cameron Research use the IGI utility
IGI225, which is a processor designed for the IGI.
Among its features is the ability to Order by Father name or
by Place name. And once received, the data is held by your
computer so you may use the same floppy discs over and
over for further Family Search sessions.

#### KIRKIN' O' THE TARTAN

Tradition has it, that following the Banning the Clanfolk in defiance used to take a small piece of Tartan to Church on Sunday. The Minister during the service, blessed the Tartan. The Kirking of the Tartan, as we know it, began in Washington, D.C., during the dark days of World War II. Dr. Peter Marshall, an American citizen, but a native born Scot was Chaplain of the USA Senate and a member of The St. Andrew Society. He preached many sermons in support of The British War Relief and The Scottish Clan Evacuation Plan. Frequently his sermons were published and sold for the benefit of those programmes. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> May 1943 his sermon titled "Kirkin' O' the Tartan" proved a stimulus to churchmen and laity alike. About the same time The St. Andrew Society in Washington began an annual religious event also known as "The Kirking". In 1950 the "Kirking" became an annual ceremony in Washington National Cathedral and the observance has now spread worldwide. The Theme is the praise and the thanksgiving for the relief of constraints the Crown imposed by The Act of Proscription in 1747, which placed a ban on the gathering together of persons, the carrying of guns, the wearing of the kilt, and the playing of bagpipes.

# **HOGMANAY**

The Clan Forsyth Society produced this Hogmany article in a recent Newsletter of theirs. It is acknowledged with thanks.

**What is Hogmanay?** Hogmanay is New Years Eve, December 31, the night when Scotsmen the world over go to town in celebrations. They claim that nowhere is the occasion more celebrated than in Scotland, where the festivities go on all through the night often until 7 am next morning.

In olden days Scots gathered to greet the New Year at places like the Iron Kirk in Edinburgh or the market cross or church steeple in their local town. There was singing and dancing in the streets.

An old Scots rhyme puts it:

"Get up, good wife, and shake your feathers, And dinna think that we are beggars, For we are bairns come out to play, Get up and gie's oor Hogmanay"

"First-footing", the traditional custom of trekking round homes of friends and neighbours, is still practiced in Scotland today. You are welcomed at hundreds of parties, so long as you arrive carrying a small gift like a piece of coal or a half-bottle of whisky or a cake of shortbread (or all three perhaps).

People supposed to be unlucky "first-foots" are grave diggers, hangmen, witches, ministers, and doctors.

The word "Hogmanay" is thought to come from France. Others say that Hogmen were hillmen, believed to be the Elves or "Good Folk" who lived in the hills. In the olden days the first person to walk over your doorstep on Hogmanay carried an evergreen branch symbolising continuing life. He had to go straight to the fire, stir the dying embers, then turn around and greet the entire household. Not until that moment was anybody allowed to speak.

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# **HAGGIS**

The Elliot Clan Society is responsible for this do-it-yourself Haggis recipe. Should we try it before we say thank you? Well, probably not, there doesn't seem to have been a marked decline in Elliot numbers since it was published in February. But will it work without first taking "one sheep's pluck"? the purist might ask -- why not try it and see.

Haggis <u>The</u> Scottish Delicacy. Here is an easy recipe from Elisabeth Luard. Elizabeth is married to writer Nicholas Luard whose ancestral village is in the north of Skye and has written a number of books on European cooking including "The Old World Kitchen".

This version of Haggis does not need the traditional sheep's stomach to enfold it. This is a delicious dish, especially for those of us of Scottish background.

# Ingredients (per person allow)

1 handful pinhead oatmeal (if unavailable, put rolled oats through a food processor)

125 g of liver, heart, pluck (lungs)

1 large onion

30g suet

thyme (fresh or dried), pepper and salt to taste

#### Method

Boil the meats until cooked, then grate coarsely on a cheese grater. Save the stock from the cooked meats. Grate the onions, add fresh or dried thyme to taste, and plenty of freshly ground black pepper. Grate the suct and add to mixture with the oatmeal. Moisten all ingredients with stock from the cooked meats. Add salt to taste and cook in an uncovered pan for about 30 minutes. Serve very hot.

#### CELTIC COUNCIL OF AUSTRALIA

This Council, consisting of representatives from all the Celtic Communities in Australia - Irish,
Scots, Welsh, Cornish, Manx and Breton, was formed ten years ago with the principal objects of arranging University
teaching of Celtic Studies and otherwise promoting Celtic culture.

The decade has certainly seen Celtic Studies at degree level established at the University of Sydney at the Celtic Council's initiative. There has also been a remarkable and still firmly growing consciousness among the Celtic Communities of their common ancient brotherhood. They are in fact startlingly similar temperamentally and culturally - despite the sorrows and separations of the long centuries since the Celts first appeared in history in Central Europe.

The studies and the music and the sports they have shared for centuries, they still share. This has resulted in Celtic Festivals in Sydney on Australia Day, in Glen Innes (where the Celtic Council initiated the magnificent Ring of Standing Stones as a 200 year Memorial to Celtic Contribution to Australia), in Hobart, in Brisbane (where the Council has a State Branch) and most recently in Geelong where Peter Alexander, Chairman of the Council from its formation, officially launched the Festival there. All the Communities - of course still proud of their Irish, Scots, Welsh etc., unity, have cooperated.

The Council's Standing Committee consists of elected representatives from each Community. It meets monthly in Sydney and has a continuing programme of Celtic development. In that regard, Celtic Studies are in being in Newcastle and under discussion at the University of Queensland and Deakin University in Victoria.

In recognition of the work done over many years by volunteers who have kept the Celtic cause and culture alive in Australasia, the Council has initiated a system of Celtic honours. The New South Wales State Governor, the Australian Government and State Premiers have all acted to present such honours to recipients. The most recent award was to Robin MacKenzie-Hunter for his work with the Gaelic Choir. He is a *Duine Uasal* (Gaelic for Honoured Person). Congratulations to him.
