
How to get to Oban:

Leo Patrick Anscar M^cPhee (W75-129) Kalumburu Mission Via Wyndham Western Australia

My name is Leo Patrick Anscar M°Phee . the Nordic 'Anscar' is my religious name as a Benedictine Monk. Born the twelfth child of a twelfth child, my parents were Hector Alexander and Catherine Cecilia M°Phee both born in Western Victoria. My Scottish Grandfather died in 1902 in Natimuk Victoria. I have thirty-eight nephews and nieces and about fifty Grand nephews and nieces. My Birthplace was Beulah Victoria in 1939, but growing up in Mont Albert, Melbourne. I entered the Abbey at New Norcia WA in 1957 was ordained priest in 1964 for the Abbey. From there on I was involved in training young monks, giving spiritual retreats, directing a spirituality group of lay people associated with the monastery and producing a Newsletter for them, 'Life in Christ' for eighteen years, there was also chaplaincy work in our colleges, the setting up of a large museum, and work amongst local aboriginals.

At one stage I studied in Rome and managed to drop in to eleven countries on the way, including and especially the land of my ancestors. I visited Spean Bridge, fort William and Lochaber in particular were Grandfather M°Phee lived and traced connections with the M°Killops (for a little name dropping on account of Blessed Mary M°Killop- whose father came from the same area) Colonsay and Oransay also got a visit.

I came to this aboriginal mission on Kalumburu in 1982. It is located on the further most point north in WA. By then I needed a right climate for my SLE (Lupus-blood complaint) and have been here ever since. The Bishop of Broome has me write a column in his local paper – The Kimberley Community Profile- while looking after catholic communities down the road from Kalumburu (up to round 800 kilometers). I have been greatly helped by Anglican and Uniting church ministers stopping by. I will miss the Kimberley when the time comes to go, those vast distances, horrific roads, the exploring, the rock paintings, the fossils and primordial rocks, our museum, and most of all the aboriginal people, their culture, language and struggle to enter the modern age, their laughter and their pain.



Margaret (Maggie) Caroline McCathie-Neville (V90-724) Born in Barham NSW to John Bruce McCathie and Isobel Noel Fulton.

I grew up in Bendigo (Vic) and after leaving school, I eventually commenced a long career as a psychiatric nurse, living and working mainly in Melbourne.

In 1997 I retired from nursing after working for 8 years with disturbed adolescents and children at Travan core child and adolescent psychiatric unit, a part of the Royal Childrens Hospital.

I now work as an artist. I am a painter and photographer. I married Charles Neville in 1996. We have just returned from living for a year in Boston USA where Charles worked for the World Wide Web consortium. During that year we travelled to Europe and made a short trip to Scotland where we spent time in Edinburgh, Dundee, Perth and Crieff. I am returning to Scotland in May this year and hope to visit Colonsay. In my spare time I am involved with a medieval re enactment group called 'Nordmania'. We take 'living history ' displays into schools and festivals to give the kids and the public a taste of medieval life; food, dance, music, combat,, craft, and costume.

We hold regular feasts and meet with other groups from around Australia for a Medieval Conference every two years for four days of fighting, feasting and lots of fun. We aim to be as authentic as possible, we all do lots of research and make all our own equipment for swords and mail shirts, to dresses and drinking vessels. I would love to be able to catch some Scottish reenactors doing their thing when I visit in May. I have a cat called Isobelle and an unruly garden which I love attending to. I also enjoy reading, music(particularly Medieval) and Middle Eastern dance.

Slice-free impact (Golf) Be teed up, Treasurer Ian McPhee is known to play off a 4 handicap

Century Quandary's its happened before

We constantly hear about the year 2000, the bug, the problems etc, but they sort themselves out, or do they? In the year 1900 the ship Warrimoo under Captain John Phillips was crossing the Pacific from Vancouver to Australia. At midnight it lay exactly on the Equator at the point where it crosses the International date line. Thus a bizarre situation arose. Forward the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere in mid-Summer, the stern in the Northern Hemisphere in mid-Winter, aft it was December 30th 1899, forward it was January 1st 1900. Therefore the ship was in two different days, two different months, and two different seasons, and two different centuries, all at the one time. But spare a thought for the passengers and crew, December 31st disappeared before they could celebrate New Year's Eve. (Naval Records)

Scotland's Oldest New Year Fire Festival.

According to the Julian Calendar (which was superseded by the Gregorian Calendar in 1582). The New Year celebrations were premature. The "Hogmanay of Scottish New Year" was celebrated on the 11th of January.

The national library of Scotland in Edinburgh is Scotland's only legal deposit library and one of just six such libraries in the British Isles. This allows them to claim a free copy of all UK and Irish publications, but unfortunately does not cover (at the present time) publications in other forms of media such as CD-Rom, DVD, Microform and Audio Tapes. The library has considerable holdings dealing with emigration from Scotland.

Australians Anglo-Celtic population is falling.

It will come as no surprise to Australians researching their family histories to learn 60 per cent of Australian Families are Ethnically mixed and approximately 20 per cent have at least 4 ancestries. A recent study published in a Monash University journal reveals that the Anglo-Celtic population of Australia was strongest just after WWII at 90 per cent, but fell to 70 per cent in 1999.

Cousins Explained

Often people are, confused when describing family relationships, and sometimes even distant relatives are referred to simply as "Cousins". The following may help to clarify different "Levels of Cousins":

First Cousin - The child of a persons uncle or aunt. First Cousin once removed - The child of a first Cousin.

First Cousin twice removed - The grandchild of a first Cousin


Second Cousins - The children of first Cousins.

Searching: Does any one know anything about regard to these two men).

<u>Duncan Love Macphie</u> is the youngest son of Donald Macphie, schoolmaster of Cumbemauld public school (Scotland). Duncan was born on the 8th of October 1888 at the schoolhouse in Cumbernauld. He was a tea merchant or grower (Ceylon?) who retired to Australia, possibly WA (Perth?). He died interstate some time between 1945\1949. Unfortunately Duncan did not marry and he died without leaving a will.

In 1873\74 there was the second of two unsuccessful expeditions to drove stock from Queensland to Port Darwin. The second expedition was led by Price Cox. The party consisted of Price Cox, Joseph Williams (from Peak Downs, expert drover and leader),

Duncan McPhee (later important in the Northern Territory), George Reid (Read), J.J.Aitkins, Harry Bligh Waller (described as pilot), Charlle Miller (described as having made the crossing before). With the exception of MePhee, almost all of the other men left the Territory within a few years. If anyone has information in regard to these two men, could you please let me know (Trevor Phee Clan Historian).

Ancestors of the Raj.



Departure point for the ships listed is the final port of departure from Britain or Ireland. A ship from Liverpool or Plymouth, for instance, may well have taken passengers on board in Scotland before proceeding south for final departure.

Macfie Legends

The beginnings of the clan are lost in antiquity, but the legend of an ancestor who was a seal woman has been passed down for centuries. Perhaps it was inspired by the familiar grey seals that breed on Eilean Nan Ron (Seal Island) at the tip of Oronsay. MacPhee and the Seal Woman

There was once a maiden from the mainland who was betrothed to MacPhee. They were to be married on Colonsay, but the boat carrying her to the wedding capsized in a wild storm and all were drowned. Weeks passed while MacPhee searched for his bride on every rocky shore. He could not find her and nothing comforted him. It was well known in those days that when seals found young women who had drowned, they gave them sealskin clothing and showed them how to live in the Land under the Wave. For one night, once a moon, the seal women could shed their sealskins to bathe as mortals along the shore.

MacPhee's betrothed was rescued by the seals. For months she swam with them until at last they came close to Colonsay. One night MacPhee was awakened by her plaintive song telling him that his lost bride was near. While she was bathing, he hid her seal trousers. Then he carried her home wrapped in his plaid.

The seal woman lived with MacPhee and their children for many years, but by the law of the sea she was obliged to keep on searching for the clothing the seals had given her. One day she found her seal trousers. Although she had to leave her mortal family and return to the Land under the Waves, MacPhee and the children always were provided with fish from the sea. No one ever saw who brought them. To this day, the seal woman is remembered whenever the clan's ancestry is told.

Per fess Azure and Or, in chief a sword point upwards, Argent, hilted and pommelled of the Second between two millrinds of the Third, and in base a galley Sable under sail of the Third, Flagged of the First

Above the Shield is placed an Helmet befitting his degree, with a Mantling Azure doubled Or, and on a Wreath of the Liveries is set for Crest a demi lion rampant Sable armed and Gules grasping a millrind Argent and in an Escrol over the same this Motto

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE CATHEY REUNION ASSOCIATION

On 24th September 1950 a meeting of some 37 Catheys was held in the Fellowship Building of the Paw Creek Presbyterian Church in North Carolina, U.S.A., to plan a Cathey Reunion. Adrian S. Cathey was elected President of the embryo association and Harry L. Cathey, Vice-President. Mary Cathey (later to become Mary Cathey Summers) was elected Secretary.

The Executive appointed a number of members to sub-committees and met with them on 15th April 1951 for the purpose of finalising plans for the proposed reunion. It was decided this would be held at the Paw Creek Presbyterian Church, N.C., on Sunday, 5th August 1951.

The Committees met again on the 15th and 17th July to fine tune the Reunion programme and to hear reports from sub-committee chairmen. A draft Charter and By-laws for a proposed Cathey Reunion Association (CRA) was approved. 566 invitations were mailed.

The Reunion was an outstanding success and the Cathey Association has met regularly and grown in stature since then. From the outset the Association concentrated on recording Cathey genealogy information and to-day has a most comprehensive holding on the Cathey families of America. Sadly, of the original members who formed the CRA only 5 are still with us to-day - plus Boyt Cathey, who would have been involved but had just commenced work with GEC to help with the Korean War effort and couldn't get away at that time.

The five are Boyt's aunt Louise Cathey of High Point N.C. (aged 92); his sister Carlene, who married Pascal Hovis three years later; Glenn and Mary Cathey of Denver N.C. who have just celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary; and Hugh Cathey of Charlotte, N.C. (almost 89). All have remained active members of the CRA since its inception. Well done!

Congratulations to the Catheys on a fine record of achievement. Their next Reunion Gathering and Biennial General Meeting is scheduled for the weekend of 4th-5th August next year, fifty years to the day from their first Reunion. NEWS FROM COLONSAY

The New Village Hall was running behind schedule as we moved into the new year. Proposed opening date was then for the 4th February. The Hall is now completed. It includes meeting rooms, a large kitchen with serving hatches, disabled access, and a dressing room for the stage, as well as the large timber arched main hall. The New Hall, which is in Scalasaig, within sight of the pier, is truly magnificent inside although it appears very modest from the outside. It will provide facilities for all kinds of social and recreational activities on the island for years to come and is a hugely welcome improvement on the old and now sadly outdated hall at Kiloran.

The Hall was build by Alexander Black's of Oban, to a design by architect Ian Gillies of Johnson-Gillies of Dunblane and the total cost of the project is £370,000. The Millennium Commission's 21st Century Village Halls for Scotland (SHIP) Project, administered by the Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations (SCVO), has contributed £180,000 and the Scottish Executive, Argyll & Bute Council and AIE a further £130,000 between them. Local fundraising and appeals to various other charities and businesses has secured the balance. (Including £750 from Clan Macfie).

Islanders gathered on Saturday 26 February for an "Unofficial Opening". Dougie McGilvaray, as the oldest inhabitant of the island was invited to cut the symbolic ribbon across the main door and Alex Howard, as Chairman of the Hall Committee, said a few words. Drinks and light snacks were served and everyone had the opportunity to explore the new building.

A more formal Opening Celebration, to thank all the many supporters of the project is planned for May 20,

with a buffet meal and dancing to Hector MacFadyen and his Band. Any travelling Macfies on the Island that day will be most welcome to attend. The celebration commences at 7:30 p.m.

The land where the old Hall was situated now reverts to the Colonsay Estate. The building itself has been sold to the Estate. Sale proceeds helped the fundraising for the new Hall.

Colonsay Whisky. As a fundraising project in support of the new Village Hall a line of Colonsay Village Hall Vatted Malt Whisky is available at £20.00 per bottle on Colonsay. There are only 2,000 numbered bottles in this line and those connoisseurs who have tried it report good value. Bottle No. 1 was raffled on Hogmanay last year, bottle No. 2,000 will be raffled at that time this year. Tickets are £5 each. Delivery arrangements and payments must be worked out by purchasers with the Hall Committee. Colonsay and Oronsay Heritage Trust are progressing a proposal for a Cultural and Heritage Centre to be established on Colonsay behind the Hotel site. Clan Macfie was invited to be a major participant in this project but unfortunately the suggested levels were well beyond our means. Clan support for the project has been assured and, hopefully, a way will be found to participate at a level we can afford.

TARTAN DAY

Tartan Day is celebrated on 6th April each year in the United States and 1st July in Australia.

The date in the United States was set by Congress with Senate Resolution 155 proclaiming the 6th April due to the Declaration of Arbroath having been signed on that day in 1320.

The date in Australia is a celebration of the repeal in 1782 of the Act of Proscription (1747) which, following Culloden, made it punishable with seven years transportation for wearing the tartan.

The Act of Proscription stated:

That from and after the First Day of August 1747, no man or boy within that part of Great Britain called Scotland, other than such as shall be employed as Officers and Soldiers of His Majesty's Forces, shall on any pretext whatsoever, wear or put on the clothes, commonly called Highland clothes (that is to say) the Plaid, Philabeg, or little kilt, Trowes, Shoulder-Belts, or any part whatever of what peculiarly belongs to the Highland Garb; and that no tartan or party-coloured plaid or stuff shall be used for Great coats or upper coats, and if any such person shall presume after the first said day of August, to wear or put on the aforesaid garments or any part of them, every person so offending....shall be liable to be transported to any of His Majesty's plantations beyond the seas, there to remain for the space of seven years.

This was repealed by the Government obtaining the King's

ascension on 1st July 1782. In the North there was great rejoicing. A proclamation was issued:

Listen Men. This is bringing before all the Sons of the Gael, the King and Parliament of Britain have forever abolished the act against the Highland Dress; which came down to the Clans from the beginning of the world to the year 1746. This must bring great joy to every Highland Heart. You are no longer bound down to the unmanly dress of the Lowlander. This is declaring to every Man, young and old, simple and gentle, that they may after this put on and wear the Truis, the Little Kilt, the Coat, and the Striped Hose, as also the Belted Plaid, without fear of the Law of the Realm or the spite of the enemies.

Both days are significant for Scots everywhere as too, is the Kirking of the Tartan ceremony which was introduced by the Rev. Dr. Peter Marshall at the New York Avenue, Presbyterian Church in Washington D.C., during the dark days of World War II as a token of support for the British cause. Along with Hogmanay, and every conceivable milestone in Robbie Burns

life, they see Scots celebrating around the world.

Tartan of course, means many things to many people. In the eyes of the members of the Scone RSL Pipes & Drums in New South Wales, Australia, it is a special part of their uniform, it is a significant plus to their on-parade appearance, it is CLAN MACFIE! Well done, Well Chosen.
