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

DUN EIBHINN

The detached rocky knoll situated on the skyline directly in front of the viewer is the site of Dun Eibhinn (Dun Eivan). This dun, or fort, is believed to have been built by the High King Gillee Adamnan as a royal residence in the early 11th century. It was a seat of Viking power in the Western Isles and occupied by descendants of Gille Adamnan, including Somerled and his grandson Donald, progenitor of Clan Donald. The fort came into Clan Macfie possession in the early part of the 13th century.

The Macfie or MacDuffie Chiefs were Keepers of the Records for the Lords of the Isles and the Clan provided many of the Priors for the Priory on Oronsay.

Malcolm, last Chief of Clan Macfie, moved from Dun Eibhinn in the early 17th century and the fort fell into disuse from that time.

A Family Search

I am searching for more descendants of the following couple, James Wood and Isabella McFie. Isabella was from Ballymaud, county Antrim, Ireland. She arrived in Sydney at the age of 18 on board the Earl Gray on 6th October 1848 and died at Yarraman in the district of Gunnedah on 3rd July 1883. They had 3 children Frances, Mary Anne and Alice and lived near Quirindl in NSW. After Isabella died James married twice more. He died at Woollahra, Sydney on 28th November 1903. One descendant of this couple is a Mr. Cooper who lives in the Newcastle (NSW) suburb of Mayfield.

- Margaret McPhee 30th March 1905, 84 vears. Wife of the above.
- Mrs. MacFie of Sydney died in Dutch East Indies, page 8: 14/12/1926.
- John McPhee, 89 years died at Mosman on 16th Nov 1926: pages 7&9 17/11/1926.
- John McPhee, 61 years, died at Cronulla on 13th Dec 1926, page 9 14/12/1926.

The Following MacPhees were "TINKERS" or more commonly known as "GYPSIES".

Near Aberdeen, Scotland was Donald MacPhee - "The Flea Catcher". MacPhees unlucky. They took travellers in when hunted by the English red - coats, nursed wounded. Later married into travellers. S-A-L-M-O-N never said among travellers - unlucky, because ordinary man can only get it by poaching. Pheasant is lucky. Black cat is unlucky. Jeannie's experience, cut hand etc.

Near Pitlochry, Scotland was Charlie MacPhee. Father a travelling tinsmith. Most travellers made baskets or tinware. Talk of father's craftmanship. Mother did the soldering. Sold their goods from door to door from cart. Lived in caravans.

Near Pitlochy, Scotland was Charlie MacPhee and his daughter Isobel. Travelling People. Charlie was a good builder, though untrained. Can do dyestone dyking. Travellers good at what ever they take an interest in it's in the blood. "I (Charlie) was never stuck on anything yet". Women are skilled also. Wife makes fine baskets, paper flowers. Isobel: Gypsies tend to be good at art. Grandfather was a Gaelic speaker. General conversation about Gaelic - all MacPhees had it. Used to have to pay for education - 3d. a day; so farmworkers, gypsies, fishermen etc were illiterate.

Alex MacPhee Heathery Knowe Camp, near Coatbridge, Scotland. His great grandfather (on his mother's side) was a doctor. He was not a traveller, but his son joined and married into the travellers. Their name was Sutherland.

Alex MacPhee, Isa MacPhee Heathery Knowe Camp, near Coatbridge, Scotland. Alex feels that to settle in one place would be to wait for time to catch up to you. Advantages of having a caravan site to stay on in the winter - children get to school etc. Isa went to school in various places, but was illiterate until she was taught by Duncan Williamson when she was about 17 or 18. Duncan is a cousin of Isa's father Alex.

During a visit or Scotland in 1997 a few graveyards were visited to look for traces of MacPhees. This included a cemetery near Glencoe and a small graveyard at Corpach near Fort William. Here there were many MacPhees and Cameron graves obviously a legacy to their relationships over the years.

The graveyard at Corpach was unfortunately in a poor state of repair with many headstones broken and fallen over and some most likely moved around the cemetery. With the right permission this would be a good project to clean up the cemetery and put respect back into the final resting place of many of Clan members.

THE PICTS - SCOTLAND'S LOST ANCESTORS

The Picts are the earliest people of Scotland about whom we have any reliable written record – and what we do have comes from sources hostile or unsympathetic to the Pictish world, such as the Romans, the Scots and the Angles.

The first recorded mention of them is in a Roman poem from late in the 3rd Century AD, which mentions 'pictii', or 'painted men', and it is likely that the Romans, by posing a large, organised, threat, caused the fragmented northern tribes to band together for the first time. According to the Roman historian Tacitus, Agricola defeated a united army of tribesmen, collectively named Caledonians, at Mons Graupius, possibly near Huntly in Aberdeenshire, in the 1st Century AD.

But despite this success, no further attempts were made to conquer the northern lands. The Romans certainly respected these enemies – Hadrian's Wall, the largest fortification in Europe, was built to keep them out, and another huge structure, the Antonine Wall, was built to protect the Romans' short-lived incursion up to the River Forth. One legion, the Ninth, completely disappeared – possibly in Galloway. By the 5th Century AD and the Roman withdrawal from Britain, the major northern tribes were recognised, at least by outsiders, as one people; the Irish called them 'Cruithni', the 'People of the Designs' and others knew them as Picts, but it is not known what they called themselves.

Their lands were in the north and the east – Pictish legend suggests how they were divided in the story of Cruithne, a warrior king who ruled for 100 years, and

on whose death the land was split among his seven sons: Fib (Fife); Cat (Caithness); Fidach (Moray); Ce (Aberdeenshire, Banff and Buchan); Circenn (Angus); and Fotlaig (Atholl and Strathearn). South-west Scotland was controlled by the British Kingdom of Strathclyde, and the Western Highlands were populated by Scots – people from the north of Ireland who invaded Argyll in 500 AD and set up the kingdom of Dalriada.

An Irish legend says the Picts came from Sythia, near the Black Sea, and were helped to settle in Scotland by an Irish king they had helped against his enemies, who also gave them the widows of fallen Irish warriors as brides on condition they always choose their kings from the female line.

The Dalriadan Scots were keen on this story, because it gave them a claim to kingship over the Picts, but if the Picts had been genuinely matrilinear, they would have been unique in Dark Age Europe. The only evidence to back the idea is the Irish myth, repeated as a throwaway remark by the Venerable Bede in 'History of the English Church and Peoples'.

The Picts were almost certainly Celts, a group of peoples who spread across Europe from the Near East from around 1000 BC and who today only remain in Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Cornwall, Isle of Man and Brittany. Their language was probably more like Welsh and Cornish than Gaelic; compare the number of place names beginning 'Aber' (river mouth) in eastern Scotland and in Wales

Their tribal society was probably organised around a chieftain with a retinue of elite warriors, surrounded by poor subsistence farmers who paid tribute to the warrior class and fought only in desperate self-defence. With the withdrawal of the Romans, successful chiefs began to establish power bases, and High Kings would arise. This cohesion was further fuelled by the arrival of Christianity, bringing a literate clergy which formed the basis of administration, and a theology which justified and confirmed royal power.

In 603 AD an army led by King Aedan of Dalriada, who had married a Pictish princess, and his allies from Pictland and Strathclyde, marched to meet the aggressively expansionary Northumbrians (Angles) at Degastan. The Angles were victorious, and spent the next 80 years occupying southern Pictland. In 680 AD, Bridei, grandson of King Neithon of Strathclyde, conquered the northern Pictish lands, and by 683 AD had also taken the Scots' capital at Dunadd in Argyll.

Then followed a battle without which the later nation of Scotland might never have existed. In 685 AD, Bridei slaughtered the Northumbrians at Dunnichen, near Forfar in Angus. Their King, Egfrid, and his retinue were all killed and the Northumbrian powerbase

broken forever, while Pictland, now under one ruler, entered a period of ascendancy.

Pictland and Dalriada were still separate kingdoms, but there were unions under Oengus Mac Fergus in 731 AD and Constantine Mac Fergus in 811 AD, and the royal houses were heavily intermarried. The final pressure for union came from the Vikings, who decimated the Pictish nobility in battle, and in 842 AD Kenneth Mac Alpin, king of Dalriada, moved his court to the ancient Pictish royal centre at Scone, bringing with him the Stone of Destiny from Dunadd. He became the first true King of Scots in 848 AD.

QUEEN MUM

This royal matriarch was born in London, but her father was Earl of Strathmore and Kinghorne, and their ancestral home, Glamis Castle in Sandringham, Scotland, is her favourite place. So, although the 100 year-old Queen Mother lives just down the road from Buckingham Palace, her Scottish roots are deep; The Bowes-Lyon family is descended from the Royal House of Scotland.



The Queen Mother was born Lady Elizabeth Angela Marguerite Bowes-Lyon on August 4, 1900. She was the ninth child of ten born to Sir Claude George Bowes-Lyon and wife Cecilia Nina. At age 22, Lady Elizabeth married the duke of York, second son of King George V, becoming the Duchess of York. Known for her charm and grace, Elizabeth was promptly nicknamed "The Smiling Duchess".

If not for the abdication of Edward VIII and his famous marriage to Wallace Simpson, the Duke and Duchess of York may have lived a very different life. Instead, their coronation took place on 12 May 1937, and they assumed the responsibilities of the throne. At this time, Elizabeth became the first commoner in three hundred years to wear the Queen Consort's crown.

Her husband had never expected to be King, and at times found the job disagreeable, so Queen Elizabeth's unwavering support proved very important. She had already captured the hearts of the British people, and her ease in public life went a long way in making up for the King's difficulties. During WWII, Elizabeth stayed in London with her husband during bombing raids, and this earned the monarchs the respect of the nation.

King George and Queen Elizabeth had two daughters. Princess Elizabeth, born on 21 April 1926 at the Strathmores' London home, 17 Bruton Street. Princess Margaret was born in August of 1930 at Glamis Castle.

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BUNADOON 2002

A fabulous day was had at the Bundanoon Gathering on the 6th April 2002. The weather was bright and about 20 degrees. An estimated 20,000 attended the Gathering and all went away with a smile on their face. The atmosphere was electric as the bands played and the traditional Scottish games took place.

To see brawny Scots lifting between 100-150Kgs is something to be seen to be believed. The stones are modelled on the Maglashen Stones from Scotland they consist of a set of five round stones ranging from 100-150Kgs in weight. Only five stones are used at one time with the current competition set comprising of the 100Kgs, 110Kgs, 120Kgs, 140Kgs, and 150Kgs. The stones vary in size from 43 centimetres to a massive 50 centimetres in diameter.

The history of the stones goes back over one thousand years to the highlands of Scotland when a boy was considered to have reached manhood when he could lift two stone in weight from the bare ground onto the top of a stone dyke or fence.

A Taste of Scotland - Grosert Fool

- 11b of Gooseberies, topped and tailed.
- · 6 oz of castor sugar
- ! can of condensed milk

(From; Scottish Banner).

- · half pint extra thick double cream
- Fresh mint sprigs for decoration.

Method

Wash gooseberries and discard any brown ones. Place into a saucepan and simmer for 6-8 minutes stirring occasionally.

Allow to cool slightly then rub through a nylon sieve to make a puree.

Stir sugar into puree until it is dissolved.

Whip cream until thick and fold in condensed milk.

Carefully fold gooseberry puree into cream mixture to create a marbled effect. Spoon into glasses and decorate with mint sprigs before serving (Makes 4 servings)

The above donations were received direct by the Clan Commander and were not payable to the Clan Travel Fund. (The Clan Travel Fund receives donations from the Clan Societies and Clan members around the world to assist with the Commander's expenses and is accounted separately in the Clan's Annual Financial Statements.) The difference above of A\$6,075.27, as well as other expenses relating to the Gathering and Parliament, and visits to Colonsay and Edinburgh, were met by the Clan Commander.

Saint Andrew - Patron Saint of Scotland

Saint Andrew is the Patron Saint of Scotland, and St. Andrew's Day is celebrated by Scots around the world on the 30th November each year. The flag of Scotland is the Cross of St. Andrew, and this is widely displayed as a symbol of national identity.

The "Order of Saint Andrew" or the "Most Ancient Order of the Thistle" is an order of Knighthood which is restricted to the King or Queen and sixteen others. It was established by James VII of Scotland in 1687.

Very little is really known about St. Andrew himself. He was thought to have been a fisherman in Galilee (now part of Israel), along with his elder brother Simon Peter (Saint Peter). Both became followers (apostles) of Jesus Christ, founder of the Christian religion.

St. Andrew is said to have been responsible for spreading the tenets of the Christian religion through Asia Minor and Greece. Tradition suggests that St. Andrew was put to death

by the Romans in Patras, Southern Greece by being pinned to a cross (crucified). The diagonal shape of this cross is said to be the basis for the Cross of St. Andrew which appears on the Scottish Flag.

St. Andrew's bones were entombed, and around 300 years later were moved by Emperor Constantine (the Great) to his new capital Constantinople (now Istanbul in Turkey). Legend suggests that a Greek Monk (although others describe him as an Irish assistant of St. Columba) called St. Rule (or St. Regulus) was warned in a dream that St. Andrew's remains were to be moved and was directed by an angel to take those of the remains which he could to the "ends of the earth" for safe-keeping. St. Rule dutifully followed these directions, removing a tooth, an arm bone, a kneecap and some fingers from St. Andrew's tomb and transporting these as far away as he could. Scotland was close to the extremities of the known world at that time and it was here that St. Rule was shipwrecked with his precious cargo.

St. Rule is said to have come ashore at a Pictish settlement on the East Coast of Scotland and this later became St. Andrews. Thus the association of St. Andrew with Scotland was said to have begun.

Perhaps more likely than the tale of St. Rule's journey is that Acca, the Bishop of Hexham, who was a renowned collector of relics, brought the relics of St. Andrew to St. Andrews in 733. There certainly seems to have been a religious center at St. Andrews at that time, either founded by St. Rule in the 6th



century or by a Pictish King, Ungus, who reigned from 731 to 761.

Whichever tale is true, the relics were placed in a specially constructed chapel. This chapel was replaced by the Cathedral of St. Andrews in 1160, and St. Andrews became the religious capital of Scotland and a great center for Medieval pilgrims who came to view the relics.

There are other legends of how St. Andrew and his remains became associated with Scotland, but there is little evidence for any of these.

including the legend of St. Rule. The names still exist in Scotland to-day, including St. Rules Tower, which remains to-day amongst the ruins of St. Andrews Cathedral.

It is not known what happened to the relics of St. Andrew which were stored in St. Andrews Cathedral, although it is most likely that these were destroyed during the Scottish Reformation. The Protestant cause, propounded by Knox, Wishart and others, won out over Roman Catholism during the Reformation and the "idolatry of catholism", that is the Saints, relics, decoration of churches, were expunged during the process of converting the Roman Catholic churches of Scotland to the harsh simplicity of Knox's brand of Calvanism.

The place where these relics were kept within the Cathedral at St. Andrews is now marked by a plaque, amongst the ruins, for visitors to see.

The larger part of St. Andrew's remains were stolen from Constantinople in 1210 and are now to be found in Amalfi in Southern Italy. In 1879 the Archbishop of Amalfi sent a small piece of the Saint's shoulder blade to the re-established Roman Catholic community in Scotland.

During his visit in 1969, Pope Paul VI gave further relics of St. Andrew to Scotland with the words "Saint Peter gives you his brother" and these are now displayed in a reliquary in St. Mary's Roman Catholic Cathedral in Edinburgh.



The Legend of the Saltire

ATHELSTANEFORD has a special place in Scotland's history. In 832 AD near this East Lothian village a battle was fought and the St. Andrew's Cross, or Saltire, was

adopted as Scotland's national flag.

This day in late Autumn 832, has been described as the day Scotland was born. A turning point in history, on that great and glorious day 1169 years ago, when the brave and valiant Scots defeated their enemies.

The national flag of Scotland, the white saltire on a blue background, is the oldest flag in Europe and the British Commonwealth, and it originated in a battle fought in the village of Athelstaneford in the Dark Ages between the Picts and Scots on the one side and the Angles of Northumbria on the other.

An army of the Picts under the leadership of Angus mac Fergus High King of Alba, assisted by a detachment of Scots led by Eochaidh, King of Dairiada, had been on a cattle raid into Lothian (Northumbrian territory), and were being pursued by an overwhelming detachment of the Angles and Saxons under their leader Athelstan.

King Angus led prayers for deliverance to God and the saints, and was rewarded by seeing a cloud formation of the Saltire (the diagonal cross on which St. Andrew had been martyred) against the blue sky. The King vowed that if, with the Saints help, he gained victory, then Andrew would become the patron saint of Scotland.

The Scots did win, Andrew became the patron saint of Scotland and the Saltire became the National flag in accordance with the King's vow.

In the pursuit, so the tradition goes on, the Northumbrian leader, Athelstan, was slain at the crossing of the Peffer or Cogtail Burn, the site of which is marked by Athelstaneford Mains Farm, about half a mile south-east of the village.

The Saltire is also known as the Saint Andrew's Cross.



WORLD WAR II - 1939-45

NX11124, Lance Corporal Keith John McPhee, 3rd Battalion AIF

Born at Werrington NSW on 6th April 1913. Keith was the first son to Amy Annie and James Alexander McPhee, of Springwood, NSW. He was educated at Springwood and Parramatta Schools.

He enlisted in the 2nd AIF on 26th April 1940, and after a short training period, embarked on the 'Aquatania' en route to the Middle East. There he was in action in Palestine, Libya and Greece. In April 1942 he returned to Townsville, and in September 1942 went to New Guinea, where he served until October 1945.

Corporal K.J. McPhee was one of the early volunteers to join the AIF in World War II, and was in the first major action against the enemy at Bardia, Libya.

The defences at the fortress Port of Bardia on the Libyan coast covered an area 11 miles long and 5 miles deep. Minefields, anti-tank ditches and 80 fortified machine gun pits, all behind a continuous double apron barbed wire fence, formed the desert defensive perimeter of Bardia.

The Italian defenders had their heavy artillery dug in 2 miles behind the perimeter, and the 45,000 strong garrison was confident of holding the port town against any attack.

In the darkness on the night of 2nd January 1941, the AIF attacking force assembled 1000 yards from the Italian perimeter defences. Following the tracks of the British tanks that were to lead the assault, the troops trudged through the cold dusty predawn gloom at 5.00am next morning, towards the enemy perimeter of Bardia.

Our artillery barrage pounded the Italian outposts and their artillery responded, while the AIF troops plodded resolutely towards the enemy.

While our shells were still bursting on the perimeter, the tanks fired on the outposts, and bangalori torpedoes were exploded under the barbed wire to blow gaps for the infantry to pass through. Keith McPhee's 2/3 Btn pushed through the gaps in the wire and captured the high ground directly overlooking Bardia Port, still 2 miles away. This capture concluded the first stage of the attack.

Italians in their outposts, who were bypassed and attacked from the rear by our troops and tanks, surrendered in their thousands during the day.

The attack was resumed the following day, 4th January 1941, and the remaining enemy outposts were taken, and the Port of Bardia captured. The whole Italian garrison was taken prisoner - over 40,000 men, most of whom spent the rest of the War at Cowra POW Camp in NSW.

At Bardia, the AIF had planned and victoriously fought its first set piece major battle of World War II, and had similar success at Tobruk; and Lance Corporal Keith McPhee shared the glory.

Keith went on to fight alongside the New Zealanders as an ANZAC in Greece and Crete where there was little glory, and no victory, against the overwhelming German forces. He spent the last years of the War fighting the Japanese in the New Guinea jungles.

Apart from malaria and some minor injuries, he was fortunate to survive his 5 years of Service. He died suddenly of a heart attack on 9th April 1989, at Yass, NSW.

A FEW RECORDINGS



There is still only one album with an explicit focus on Swedish bagpipes - the Säckpipa recording (LP) by Per Gudmundson. This is probably the most important record for a Swedish bagpiper to have in his/her collection. A lot has happened since the record was made in 1983, however, so maybe it is time to make a new record, documenting 20 years of development of both pipes and pipers.

The quartet *Blå Bergens Borduner* (The drones from the blue mountains) include three Swedish bagpipers.

Alban Faust, one of the

major bagpipe makers and pipers in Sweden, has a CD called Bordunmusik från Dalsland (Drone music from Dalsland). Most tracks include bagpipes of Swedish, French, German or

Flemish origin. 10 tracks include Swedish bagpipes.

Then there are a number of records where bagpipes are used, but more sparingly. Groups to look out for are, for example, Hedningarna, Frifot and Valramn. Piper names to look for include Anders Norudde (formerly known as Anders Stake), Per Gudmundson, Harald Pettersson and Stefan Ekedahl.



CLAN PROJECTS

Colonsay Projects Funding. As mentioned in our last Clan News costing for our Clan projects on Colonsay last year exceeded available funds by some £575. The Welcome Wall

In one of history's great migrations, more than 6 million people have crossed the world to settle in Australia. To honour the achievements of these immigrants & their contribution to building today's Australia, a Welcome Wall 100 metres long, was constructed at Pyrmont, on the shores of Sydney Harbour, next to the National Maritime Museum.



The Welcome Wall features the names of immigrants engraved on bronze panels. Approached by The Australian National Maritime Museum , the Scottish Australian Heritage Council assisted in the preparation of the Official Opening of the Welcome Wall by the Governor General of Australia Sir William Dean was on Sunday 24 January 1999. Four young Australians of Scottish descent , two boys and two girls dressed in Scottish National costume arrived with the Governor General and accompanied the Official Party to the wall to assist with the unveiling.

Scotland has provided many Australian settlers from the early 1800 until today. A good number of whom have already had their names inscribed on the Welcome Wall Australians of Scottish descent were well represented by these young Australians who stood in & proudly representing their Scottish Ancestors on this important occasion.

A computer database and web page will bring to life the history of the names which appear on the Welcome Wall. This database will be accessed within the National Maritime Museum and via the Internet.
