



NEW BOOK RELEASE: THE MCPHEES OF ARGYLL

A new book written by Ian McPhee, titled The McPhees of Argyll, has just been published. This his-



tory book, which could also be described as an historical novel, is the culmination of over 5 years extensive research that utilised a wide variety of sources both in Scotland and Australia.

The book begins with an explanation of how Scotland came into being as a nation. It provides historical information that had an impact on the people of Scotland with particular reference to those in the Highlands. Topics covered include the Norwegian occupation, the Lord of the Isles, the Highland Line, Presbyterianism, The Statutes of Iona, the Battle of Culloden and the Dress Act.

A full chapter is devoted to a history of the McPhee clan. The author has sought to address the lack of a comprehensive, easy to read, concise history of the clan. Clan structure, clan customs, and the clan name are all discussed in detail. The story of the McPhee clan on its ancestral island home of Colonsay, how it became a 'broken clan' and was finally re-established in the 20th century, is also explored.

The book is focused on the Western Isles of Scotland where many Highland clansmen lived. It follows the lives of a typical Highland family over several generations from the earliest time that records of its existence can be found. In doing so it endeavours to give those unfamiliar with bygone Gaelic Scotland an insight into how people lived and worked. On the Isle of Mull the family lived a traditional life in the 1700s and became part of a crofting community in the 1800s.

Like tens of thousands of other Scottish Highlanders, the subjects mentioned in this book were caught up in the infamous Highland Clearances. Eventually they were forced to migrate to Australia. Their journey as pioneers in the outback of their adopted home comes to an end in the early years of the 1900s.

The McPhees of Argyll is an easy to read, high quality publication comprising over 300 pages with 81 photos, maps and sketches. It is fully indexed and referenced, with a comprehensive bibliography. Four appendixes include a chronology of events in Scotland, the sovereigns of Scotland, McPhee genealogical chart and a list of the chiefs of Clan MacDhubhsith (McPhee).

MCPHEES INTO VICTORIA

In the 19th century over a quarter of a million Scots emigrated to Australia. Shipping records show us that there were 4,910 McPhees that arrived in Victoria during this period. These early McPhees consisted of clan chiefs, wealthy merchants, weavers labourers, farmers and many other occupations.

The earlier shipping records for Victoria start in 1841. From 1841 until 1851 McPhees arrived in Victoria in dribs & drabs and for the most part had signed up in Scotland to work on properties in Victoria. They were shepherds, black-smiths, farm servants, labourers & domestic servants. These people [as most of the emigrants to Australia] had their passage paid for, but had to pay it back once they started work.

The second lot of McPhees to arrive in Victoria arrived between 1852 & 1857 as "Highland & Island Emigrants" This period is more commonly known as "The Highland Clearances". In this second lot of emigrants were crofters [farmers] who were most often reluctant to leave their home land and who sometimes were brutally forced out [cleared] by their wealthy landlord.

At this time in Victoria, gold was discovered, and most of the male population from the cities, country towns and from farms all headed for the gold fields, thus leaving a shortage of trades people, labourers, shepherds etc. in the cities, country town and on farms. This proved beneficial to McPhees arriving in Victoria at this time in regard to finding employment. A lot of McPhees ended up with their own farms and small businesses and one was involved with the Cobb & Co stagecoach line. This particular family was from Fort William and had in fact been carriers in and around Fort William.

There were some Victorian McPhee families who left the state, for various reasons, and travelled to Western Australia, South Australia, Tasmania, New South Wales and to Queensland. Trevor Phee has information on some Scottish birth, death and marriage records, with some going back into the late 1770's. We have birth, death and marriage records from each state in Australia. These Australian records start at different times, in as such as the states were started up at different times. And also shipping records for all states of which we have just had 50 books published in this regard. Also in our Archives we have some 12 family history books published by clan members in regard to their own family and who donated a copy of their book to the clan.

My next project [even though I have been working on it for several years] is to be titled "The Fighting McPhees from Culloden to Vietnam". Our military historian Clyde Smythe started this project many years ago. He sent me all of his records several years back and I started putting it together in to a book and hope to have it published some time next year.

In regard to myself. I have had published three family history books, held three family reunions all of which were attended by over 100 family members, with some family members coming from overseas. I have also made contact with family members in England, Ireland, Scotland, Canada and New Zealand. I have been able to track down one family as far back as 1751 and have documented 11 generations in regard to this particular family and to date I have just over 650 typed pages with more to come on this family.

MCPHEES' FROM SCOTLAND TO AUSTRALIA

This book has taken many years to compile and in the introduction numerous people have been mentioned for their assistance in the gathering of shipping lists for this book. I would like to name three other people who assisted in this painstaking task Bernie McPhee in Victoria, Judith Moore in South Australia and Jillian King in Western Australia. As well there are some non Clan people who have provided shipping information.

As stated in the Introduction by A. C. (Sandy) McPhie "this book is probably not complete as in some cases there are no records for certain ships." This is the case as some of the original log books were lost, some were damaged by water, some were lost to fire and some to this day are held by descendants of captains of certain ships, but they will not part with them so that they can be copied.

All of the information in this book is from the original log books of the ships mentioned. Some ages listed in the log books may differ from family records. This can be explained. A lot of adults that immigrated to Australia put their age down by a year or more as they thought it would be easier to obtain work if they were younger than what they really were. In regard to the ages of children. Their ages were put down a year or two so as the price of paying full passage could be eluded. Also some spelling of names may be different in the records than those held by family members but, I repeat these are how they were spelt in the ships log book on which they immigrated.

The McDuffie DNA Surname Project seeks to emulate the success obtained by some other clans in applying the relatively new and accurate Male Y-Chromosome DNA Test in order to establish the Clan's genetic roots

Objective:

- To determine the degree of relatedness among those with surnames of the great McDuffie diaspora and establish links with the ancestral homeland.
- 2. To establish how closely associated surnames are linked
- 3. To assist with paper genealogical research in breaking through "brick walls"
- 4. To determine which McDuffs were McDuffies

The McDuffie DNA Surname Project is for those who have:

NEWS - NOW UP TO 63 PARTICIPANTS - 8 GROUPS HAVE MATCHES

From the Clan MacFie News July 2005 (Clan Commander)

The DNA Project. The DNA Project being conducted for the Clan by Rod McDuff of Perth, Australia, continues to gather momentum. The 17th July update of the Project website reports 26 DNA readings completed with 7 pending. Of 32 participants, 5 groups have DNA matches. The first group identified continues to produce interesting data from its 6 matches. This is the group that linked Clan Commander Sandy McPhie with an already known cousin on Prince Edward Island, Canada, and both of them to Colonsay resident, Angus MacPhee. Now they have a match with a John McDuffie in Georgia, U.S.A., and a McAfee there who traces paper records back to a McDuffie ancestor in Ireland. This surname flexibility is also evident in Commander Sandy's ancestral tree which includes MacPhie, McPhee and McFee spellings over the generations and goes back to a Neil McDiffie (MacDuffie?) b/c Argyle 1687.

The 26 (+7 pending) submissions are a small sample and more participants are required to develop patterns both new and confirming existing ones. Rod Macduff will, by the way, be attending the Clan Gathering in Inverness in September and will be making a special presentation to Clan Parliament on this on the Saturday morning. Saint Andrew 30 November 2006

Saint Andrew is the Patron Saint of Scotland, and St. Andrew's Day is celebrated by Scots around the world on the 30th November. The <u>flag of Scotland</u> is the Cross of St. Andrew, and this is widely displayed as a symbol of national identity.

The "Order of Saint Andrew" or the "Most Ancient Order of the Thistle" is an order of Knighthood which is restricted to the King or Queen and sixteen others. It was established by James VII of Scotland in 1687.

PIONEERING DAYS

From the Journal of George Everard 1830 – 1925 Pages 3 to 5

"1851 I tumbled on the right shop, at a very rough boarding house in Flinders Street. For a room mate there was a man from Phillip Island, which with French Island, was then in the hands of Messrs. McHaffie and Gardner. Two of the latter and one of the McHaffies were off to the diggings, and the old man who had accompanied them thus far was returning to Phillip Island and was wanting a cook. I grabbed the job."

"To resume, about 10 o'clock, Tom McHaffie and a nephew, about my own age (sixteen years or so) arrived with the whale boat, and we put our saddles and bridles in the boat and pulled over to Phillip Island."

"I put in four months on the Island, and it was many years before I spent so long in any other one place. Looking back after so many years I think it did me good. I learned a lot then that stood to me in after days. I should have had to put in six months but for a ship with emigrants putting in to Westernport Bay through stress of weather. McHaffie went on board and engaged two men – one as cook, the other to knock about. The next day he put me across the water on to the main land at 'Drew's Station'. At parting he acted as a real gentleman. He gave me my cheque for nine pounds, telling me not to cash it, and putting his hand in his pocket, he gave me a sovereign, saying: 'I am giving you this to take you to Geelong, where you had better go to your uncle, and, for Heaven's sake, stop there, for, with the exception of my nephew, you are the most useless object I have ever met'.

I thanked him for his kind gift and his outspoken opinions of myself and his nephew. I never saw him again, but still think of him as a kind and good man."

Retiring President Bernie McPhee welcomed everyone and gave a brief outline of the day's proceedings, commencing with his report, of which the following is a summary:

His Report, he said, covers the past two years; the time since the Biennial General Meeting in Canberra in 2004.

Issue Number 100 of the Clan Society's Australian Newsbulletin called "The Downunder" – this milestone was achieved under the guidance of Glen McPhee of the ACT. Bernie McPhee expressed sincere thanks to Glen McPhee for his editing and arranging the printing, wrapping and posting out of the Society's magazine. Glen has maintained a good mixture of items of; a) local interest, b) historical sketches as sent in by contributors, c) stories about McPhees in the Services, as contributed by Clyde Smythe, d) the Clan Commander Sandy McPhie's updating on international Macfie scene, e) listing the new members and making note of bereavements and losses to the Society, and f) listing the donations made by members to the various funds established by the Society.

Other functions attended and organized by the Australian Macfies: Each year the Clan Society is represented at various Highland Games, e.g. Bundanoon, Aberdeen, and Ringwood, and these have attracted our constant and usual faithful Macfie staff.

In Melbourne, for the Victorian members, Maggie Mulherin arranged the First and Second Annual Church Service for the Macfie Clan Society in the Scots Church Melbourne, each time attracting twenty Macfie Society members, with the encouragement and help of the Rev David Robertson of the Scots Church.

Membership: Some of our longest standing and most faithful and regular members are now getting old. In the two last years there have been quite a few new members, and we hope that from them will come the next generation of leadership. Some members failed to renew membership, and some letters have been returned by the Post Office. I suppose that this has always been the way.

Subscriptions: No change to the family rate of \$15 and the single rate annually of \$10. It is the donations which enable things to happen over and above the subscription fees.

Two new books published: Bernie said that this was a most significant achievement of members in the past two years, Trevor Phee's booklet entitled: "McPhees from Scotland to Australia in the 1800's", and lan McPhee's book: "The McPhees of Argyll". Bernie said that later in the day, he would devote a large part of his keynote speech at the BGM to introducing these two landmark achievements.

Bernie McPhee expressed thanks to Clan Commander Sandy McPhie and to Helen McPhie on behalf of the Australian Macfie Clan Society, for their continuing generous work on behalf of the Macfie Clan and Society, and especially for Sandy, his key role in the recent International Gathering and 9th Clan Parliament of the worldwide Macfie Clan Society.



Bernie McPhee in his report expressed thanks to all the Executive and Office bearers of the Macfie Clan Society of Australia, and wished them well under the new administration, both the officials staying on in office and the new officials coming into their duties from after the BGM today. He expressed special thanks to Peter McPhee and his wife Barbara for always keeping the pot of activities boiling for the Victorian Society, and for his role as Treasurer of the International Macfie Organization, and for his role as Chairman at the dinner and function today at the BGM. And he expressed gratitude to Maggie Mulherin for her role as Victorian Vice President. He knew that Maggie was not standing for office again today, and so he thanked her for her excellent work over the past number of years, for her thoughtful and kindly management of the Victorian members affairs.

Another feature of the events of the last two years has been the continuing work of Australian member Mr Roderick MacDuff of Western Australia on his DNA Project involving Clan Society members. Bernie McPhee said how Roderick reported at the last International Gathering in Inverness Scotland, and how Roderick's study could see certain patterns emerging as to family groupings of Macfie DNA. The Australian Macfie Society was very proud of the achievements in such a sophisticated scientific field of its West Australian member, and Bernie McPhee encouraged mem-

bers to avail themselves of Roderick MacDuff's expertise.

Bernie McPhee as President offered his special thanks to Anthony Gartland, Treasurer and to Margaret Booth, Secretary, for their great help to the Presidency and to the Australian members over the last two years, and he praised the two people for the measure of talent and grace which they had brought to the roles.

16th INTERNATIONAL GATHERING OF CLAN MACFIE IN CONJUNCTION WITH TRIENNIAL REUNION OF THORBURN-MACFIE FAMILY SOCIETY MEMBERS, SWEDEN, 5th TO 8th JULY 2007

Clan Commander Sandy McPhie has agreed to the Thorburn-Macfie Family Society in Sweden hosting the 16th International Gathering of Clan Macfie in Sweden in July next year. The Thorburn-Macfie Society will hold the Gathering in conjunction with its Triennial Family Reunion over the extended weekend of 5th to 8th July. A comprehensive programme is being developed and will be available shortly on the Clan Society's homepage at www.thorburn-macfie.se, together with contact details for those interested in attending.

Formed in 1937, The Thorburn-Macfie Family Society is the oldest clan society of Clan Macfie. The original family came to Sweden from Scotland in July 1823 when William Thorburn and his wife Jessy (nee Macfie) settled with their five children at "Kasen" near Uddevalla on Sweden's west coast. The Thorburns were tea merchants in Leith while Jessy Macfie was a member of the "sugar" Macfie family – her father, Robert Macfie of Langhouse, was the first member of Clan Macfie to receive a Grant of Arms (1864). In 1923 descendants gathered at the estate "Kasen" to commemorate their ancestors arrival in Sweden one hundred years earlier. This was followed in 1937 when some Thorburn and Macfie descendants decided to form a Family Society. The first Reunion was held in 1938 with subsequent reunions being held on the first Saturday in July every three years. The success of the reunions (and the society) may be judged by the group photo below taken at the 2004 Gathering.

WORLD WAR 1

No. 2169 Corporal William Henry Phee, 10th Battalion, A.I.F.

William Henry Phee was the seventh of 10 children and was born on 19th October 1891 to William and Betrice Phee at Blackstone in Queensland. (Blackstone is a suburb of Ipswich). The family moved around somewhat, so that his father could gain employment as a coalminer. The family finally settled at Cessnock in 1904.

William Henry, along with his young brother Albert Alexander (Abbie), enlisted in the AIF at Maitland on 6th March 1916. At this time William Henry was married and had a daughter. The brothers signed up with the 34th Battalion and both were assigned to the 3rd Rifles who in turn were attached to the 1st Australian Pioneer Battalion.



The two brothers left Sydney on the S.S. Clan McGillivary on 13th June 1916 and arrived in North Africa at the Australian 1st Divison HQ at Tel-El-Kebir on 5th July 1916. After a couple of weeks at HQ the brothers went overland to Alexandria and from there they sailed to England on the S.S. Arcadia, arriving in London. After a couple of weeks training they were sent to France to take part in the horrors of the Somme Battle around Pozieres and Moquet Farm.

William Henry was promoted to the rank of Sergeant on 31st March 1917, then on 26th May that year he was demoted to Corporal. Then not long after he was demoted to Private, until on 30th August 1917 he was promoted to the rank of Corporal again.

On 12th January 1918 the two brothers were separated when William Henry was transferred to the 5th Battalion until the 30th August that year when he was again transferred to the 10th Battalion. In June 1918 William Henry was gassed during the battle for Morlancourt. (The German counter measure against the slowly advancing Anzacs was to saturate the front with gas shells to force the wearing of gas masks, then to machine gun the blindly groping soldiers while they advanced.). As a result, William Henry was hospitalised for a short time, suffering also from inflammation of the knee joint.

During World War II William Henry volunteered for active service but was rejected due to his age. However he was accepted by the army with the rank of Sergeant Major and was put in charge of recruiting and training. He was living at Casino in NSW at the time.

HISTORICAL BOOKS ON MORVERN, ARGYLL BY SALLY MCPHEE

Morvern is located on the mainland in Argyll, opposite the Isle of Mull. Mull is a very pretty Island that is famous to Australians as being the home of Lachlan Macquarie. If you can trace any members of your family back to Morvern, there is a good chance they had family links with the Isle of Mull. Morvern is not particularly accessible and saw its greatest reduction of population during the 1800s because of the lack of agricultural future for the local indigenous population - the clansmen. Clan leadership in the area of Mull and Morvern had been provided by the Jacobite supporting MacLeans and Camerons, both of whom struggled to survive following Culloden. Morvern did not feature the opposed evictions by clansmen from the land of their historical roots described in popular reading today. It is more likely that the prospect of grinding poverty made emigration a more feasible option for the people of Morvern. Emigrations in the early 1800s were mostly to the Americas and by the middle of the 19th century, Australasia became a popular destination, particularly with the support of assisted passages.

Philip Gaskell, Morvern Transformed, Cambridge University Press, 1968, 3rd reprint 1996, 272p.

Together with births, deaths and marriages, family locations are a critical part of identifying where your ancestors were, and what they might have been doing. Having said that, most clansmen were listed as Agricultural labourers in censuses. Philip Gaskell has limited his study to 19th Century Morvern and has painstakingly identified all the farms in the parish of Morvern. The accompanying maps may help locate places that no longer are relevant in today's maps of the area. As many of the clansmen migrated during this period, the listings of rentals is a potential source for placing your forebears in a particular locality.

Phillip Gaskell traces changes in land ownership and thus highlights the impact of economic forces on the local people. Through emigration of continuous numbers of clansmen, he shows that by the end of the 19th Century, one way of life had been supplanted by another. A variety of primary sources, especially land records and rentals, are used to plot the transformation of Morvern. There are a sprinkling of McPhee names here and there, so well worth a look if you know your family came from this area.

lain Thornber Ed, Norman MacLeod Morvern - A Highland Parish, Birlinn, 2002, 258p

The book centres on life in a Highland parish through the eyes of Norman MacLeod (1812-1872) whose grandfather had been Minister of the Parish of Morvern. The extended family continued close ties to the Morvern area, and witnessed changes in the area with depopulation that essentially saw the end of the gaelic clan life that had been the norm for hundreds of years. The core of the book is a number of essays on life in Morvern written by Norman MacLeod.

The essays bring the character of the people to life with gentle humour and a great appreciation of what was important in clan life. Norman MacLeod also brings to life the Gael's love of the land and the great loss the emigrants felt as they said farewell to their homeland. Iain Thornber's knowledge of the area and its history helps take the reader back to a greater understanding of 19th Century Morvern. The inclusion of the data from the Duke of Argyll's 1779 census of his property, as well as the 1841 census provide reference material for those interested in family history. While the listings are still open to transcription error, there was a McPhee presence in Morvern in both 1779 and 1841.
